

# Rainbow Trials Held No Records Smashed Pals Loom Dangerous

Army Shows Star in French; Jim Cruickshank, Titleholder, Fails to Make Good in Javelin Throw;  
Results on Kamehameha Field

**A**CCORDING to the results of the trials for the Rainbow Relay carnival held yesterday at Kamehameha field, the chief contest for honors Saturday will be between the Outrigger team, the aggregations from Palama and the University of Hawaii. The Army is slated to pull a few surprises, but will hardly be serious contenders for the trophy. University and Outrigger qualified the most—16 men for each club. Palama had one less.

The times for the trials were, as a whole rather slow, and will undoubtedly be bettered Saturday. There were few surprises in the field events, the most notable exception being the fact that Jim Cruickshank, Outrigger athlete, failed to qualify in the javelin throw. This was entirely unlooked for, as Cruickshank holds the island record for that event.

## ARMY FLASH FIRST

There were four trial heats for the century novice, three men qualifying in each heat. The semi-finals are to be run Saturday. The first heat was taken with ease by French, Army, who finished in :10 1-5. He was followed by K. T. Lee, U. H. and Yap, O. C. C. The second heat went to Auld, O. C. C., with Harrison, Palama, and Dasher, Army, placing in that order. The time was :10 4-5. Itoga, running for Palama, took the next heat of the century in :10 2-5. McGuire, O. C. C., and Chanon, Army, also qualified. The final heat was an easy victory for D. Crozier, O. C. C., who bested Hadley and Jones, both Army men. The time for this race was :10 2-5.

## E. FERNANDEZ, HURDLER

The best time in the 220 low hurdles was made by E. Fernandez, U. H. runner, who captured the second heat of this event in :26 2-5. McGuire followed Fernandez to the tape. The first trial went to H. W. Ching, U. H., with Kellim, O. C. C., second. Time, :27 3-5. The third heat went to Lum, Palama, with Crozier, O. C. C., second. Lum's time was :27 1-5.

Six men qualified for the finals of the 120-yard high hurdles, the best time being made by J. Whittle, Palama, who ran the race in :18 at. Vanatta, U. H., was second in Whittle's heat. Gannon of O. C. C. took the first trial in :15 1-5, with W. Whittle and Correa, Palama, tied for second. These two men ran it out later and Whittle won the right to compete in the finals. Crawford, Army, took the third heat in :18 1-5, with Farreire, U. H., second.

## FIVE IN SHOT PUT

De Mello of Palama placed first in the trials for the shot put, heaving the weight 40 ft. 11 1-2 in. Others who qualified were A. Wriston, U. H., Naiwi, Palama, Lee, Palama, and C. Farden, O. C. C. The discus throwing event found De Mello again in the lead, with 109 ft. 4 in. to his credit. A. Wriston also placed second in the event, with C. Farden, O. C. C., Lum, Central Y, and W. Holt, U. H., also qualifying.

The best distance in throwing the javelin was made by Lum, Central Y, who scored 144 ft. 7 in. Others to qualify were De Mello, Palama, Holt, U. H., Wagner, Central Y, and Cabrana, O. C. C. Interest in this event will be considerably lessened as a result of the failure of Cruickshank to qualify. The University's star performer in the javelin event, Cruz, who was expected to give Cruickshank a run for his title, failed to show up at the trials.

The qualifying height in the pole vault was 9 ft. 6 in., and those who cleared the bar at this height were Gartley, O. C. C., Wieke, O. C. C., Tanimura, Central Y, Correa, Palama, and French, Army. Eight men were qualified in the high jump, Gannon of Outrigger leading the group, with a jump of 5 ft. 6 in. Others to qualify were Anderson and Akina, both O. C. C., Crawford, Army, Holt, U. H., Whittle, U. H.,
