

Trials For Relay Carnival At Kamehameha Field Today

Trials for the third annual Rainbow Relay carnival, sponsored by the University of Hawaii, will be held this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock on Kam field. The University has 87 entries in the trials, the Army 86, Palama 83, the Outrigger club 61, and the Y. M. C. A. 9.

The trials this afternoon will be held in all field events, the hurdles, and the 100 yard novice.

The following will probably be the leading runners: McGuire, Crozier, Melim, Danford, Penhallow, Deverill and Medeiros for the Outrigger club; Mountcastle, Eddie Fernandez, B. Farden, Hung Wai Ching and Low for the University; Castanha, Kaholwai and Stone for Palama; and Cerney for the Army. In the field events, Ross, Cruickshank and Dick Gartley, all of the Outrigger club, will probably be outstanding.

McGuire, Melim and Danford are the Punahou triplets who scampered away with a goodly number of points for the Buff and Blue in both the Cornell relays and the interskol meet. Melim has not come less than second in any race for three years. McGuire is fast building up an enviable reputation as a sprinter for one so young as he is. Danford eked out a place for himself on the Pun track team this season which he will hold without further question during the rest of his high school career.

Crozier's superiority on the track is without question. His record at Cornell speaks for itself.

Dangerous Man

Penhallow is a dangerous man in the relays. Former star of the university track team and one-time captain, he bids well to make an excellent showing in the Saturday meet.

Deverill is a former Punahou star who holds the interscholastic record for the 440 yard run and who is considered a demon when it comes to distances.

Medeiros is the 1927 star miler for St. Louis who will have to fight hard to prove his worth but will probably do so.

Hung Wai Ching, Mountcastle and Eddie Fernandez are leading runners at the university, along with Farden and Giles. Both Ching and Mountcastle have won first places in a recent interclass meet at the university, and are in top shape to give the members of the other three teams a good hard rub.

Stone, Kaholwai and Castanha are familiar to the fans who have been following the interscholastic meets for the past few years. Stone, who was the dean of Kamehameha's milers last year, is still in top-notch condition. Castanha has a good long record of first places back of him, and Kaholwai, a brilliant young Kam runner, who came to the top in the interskol pool over night, will probably bring down a number of points for Palama.

In the field events, Ross, at the

shot put; Cruickshank at the discus and javelin, and Dick Gartley at the pole vault, are outstanding entries for the Outrigger club. Kaaua, Wriston and Walter Holt of the university will match their prowess with the first two. It looks like Gartley will be supreme in the pole vault unless young Correia turns the tables. Gartley was one of Yale's foremost pole vaulters during his college days, and unless he is not in good condition, he ought to take the pole vault without much extra exertion.

Of the shorter races the 220 yard low hurdles will probably be the most exciting. The outcome will lie somewhere between Melim, McGuire and Crozier of the Outrigger club, and Eddie Fernandez and Ching of the university. Provided these five place, we predict that the outcome of this race will be: Crozier, Melim and Ching, with Eddie Fernandez and McGuire battling out for fourth place. There is a possibility, however, that Ching may nose out Melim, but if he does it will be by a very narrow margin. The record for this race may possibly go.

Young talent and old talent will battle it out for the winning points Saturday afternoon in a stupendous track classic which no one should miss.
