Frank Cerny-short, stocky and only Army entry-raced to a close victory over A. P. Helbush, unat-tached runner, yesterday morning in the annual All-Around Chinese Athletic Club marathon classic Athletic Club marathon classic which attracted a field of 12 fast starters who stepped off from the foot of Fort St. before the brand new Aloha tower to the finish which was at the start of the annual Star-Bulletin mile swim on Alawai.

Cerny gave the starters a handi-cap of five and a half minutes and came in on the final stretch to nose out Veteran Helbush by a little less than 20 yards. The timers clocked him at 40 minutes 49 seconds, but the net time or the real time that Frank Cerny covered the course in was 35 minutes 19 seconds.
