

# Deans Ride Band Wagon To 1926 Championship; Two Mile Record Falls

Palama Finishes Second in Track and Field Championships, 27 Points Behind Champs; O.C.C. and Army Next in Order; Scholtz Wins Sprints

"SQUAD" HARRISON'S University of Hawaii track and field team mounted the band wagon early in the afternoon yesterday at Kamehameha field, and before the A.A.U. championships were half over, had piloted the ship of state into a lead that Palama, Outrigger and Army were unable to cut down as the events progressed. The Varsity chalked up a total score of 73 points, to 46 for Palama, 36, Outrigger; 34, Army; 3, "Y"; 2, National Guard, and 2 unattached, and thereby walked off with the title held by Outrigger by virtue of a victory in the 1925 titular struggle.

While the Palms, Beach Combers and Army athletes pressed the Deans throughout the afternoon, the super-balanced squad from Manoa was never in serious danger, and although out-scored in some of the individual events, never relinquished the lead, once it had been safely established.

Two records were broken during the afternoon, and one island mark was equalled. Two more were established in the women's events, when Clara Maertens won the 60-yard low hurdles in :09 1-3, and the Kalihai club won the 200-yard relay in :27 2-3.

Nather, "dark horse" from the Army camp, ran to a brilliant record in the two-mile grind, going the full distance to win in 10:46 1-3, six seconds under the old mark. Nather ran a cool race all the way and allowed Man of the "Y" to set the pace for three-quarters of the distance. It was not until late in the race that he forged into the lead, which he held after a grueling straightaway with Harrison and Stone of the Pal stable. The latter pair started to sprint at the furlong mark and Nather replied with a pick up that held the lead until the tape was broken. Low, of Outrigger, finished fourth, also doing the distance under the old record.

## SCHOLTE TEARS

Jack Scholtz, world champion sprinter, and winner of the 200-yards at the last Olympic Games, won the 100-yard and 220-yard running in perfect form. Three watches caught him at :09 4-5 split, in the century and two more at :10 flat. The latter time was allowed which was not a record.

Scholtz, however, came back in the furlong and tore down the stretch to tie the island mark of :25 flat. He won by several yards from Hair who finished second. While Scholtz did not turn in any startling performances yesterday, his appearance in the championships helped to make the 1926 show the greatest ever staged in Hawaii. A head wind probably prevented him from clipping a few fifths from the furlong mark. Incidentally, that :10 flat century was the fastest :10 flat race ever run in these parts.

Eleanor Wong set up the other new island record when she won a semi-final heat of the 60-yard dash for Outrigger, were unable to eliterate. Coleman gained back half of the lost distance and Melim picked up yardage on Ted Hair, but the flying Deans could not be stopped and won in 1:32 2-3, two-fifths of a second slower than the standing record.

## SENSATIONAL MILE RUN

The widely heralded mile run, the classic event of the program yesterday did not produce a new record, but it gave the fans one of the greatest distance races ever seen in Hawaii. Burt Hooper, Outrigger, and island champion, and Bill Castanha, Palama, holder of the record, were down as the principals in a grueling four lap battle. It was more than that. Hooper stepped out to set the pace for the entire race, never once letting down from a dizzy pace into the strong wind. Castanha dogged the champion for the full distance and when the final furlong mark was reached the two starters set out on a sprint that will go down as one of the greatest of all time in local sport annals.

Castanha challenged Hooper and Hooper accepted, stepping out to hold a slight lead until he broke the tape in 4:45 1-3. Castanha was second, Kaholwai third and Cerny fourth. The result will settle all arguments concerning the respective ability of both runners until next season rolls around, when hostilities will be resumed again.

Ray Melim and Eddie Fernandez fought out a brilliant 200 yards over the low hurdles yesterday with the little Outrigger flash holding a slight lead. Eddie missed his step at the 200-yard mark, hit the next to the last flight and lost whatever chance he stood of defeating Melim. Melim won in :26 1-3 with Jimmie Whittle second, Brown third and Fernandez fourth.

the three events, the 100, 220 and 440-yard dashes, making a clean sweep of the furlong. With Scholtz' points not counting in the totals for the title, fifth places were awarded in the 100 and 200, of which the Deans captured all but the third and fourth in the century. In the quarter, Eddie Fernandez came from behind to defeat Wakatske, who had set the pace on the back stretch, and Duke Thompson followed his mate in to nose out the Palama star and nearly broke into a dead heat with Fernandez. Mountcastle of the Varsity took the fourth place.

Kaholwai returned after putting up a game exhibition in the mile run, and won the half-mile event in 2:04 2-3. Medeiros of O. C. C. made a game attempt to pass Kaholwai at the tape, but his sprint came too late, and he was a yard short at the finish line.

## WISE TAKES JAVELIN

The annual "trust" in the javelin was maintained yesterday, when Willie Wise defeated Jim Crutchshank in the event, after the latter had taken the first place in the Rainbow Relay Carnival. The same status was established last year, which gives each star two victories out of four starts. Wise failed to break "Big Jim's" mark set up last week, however.

The half-way relay was a thriller, with the Deans establishing a lead on the second lap, which Coleman and Melim, third and fourth men, for Outrigger, were unable to eliterate.
