"SPUD" Harrison's athletes from the Manoa campus jumped away to a huge lead in the A. A. U. championship track and field meet yesterday afternoon at Kamehameha field when 30 Deans slipped through the trial ordeal and qualified for further competition in the finals.

Palama, regarded as the closest rival to the Varsity was a poor second in the trials yesterday, placing but 11 men in the various events. Army, the "dark horse" of the meet came through in fine shape to equal the qualifying mark of the Palama. Outrigger, champion in 1925, was fourth with 10 men placed for the finals. The National Guard was next with three and

Jackson Scholtz, world champion sprinter marked up two for the unattached column, running under the colors of the New York Athletic club.

### ARMY LEADS

The Army is leading the field in points today as a result of Captain Joe Lehman's victory in the final of the hammer throw held late yesterday afternoon after the last trial event had been run. Lehman came through on his last try for 110 feet 3 inches to defeat DeMello of Palama who took second with 104 feet 8 inches. "Big Jim" Cruickshank was third for Outrigger with a heave five inches short of DeMello's best, and Benson of the Central "Y" chalked up a point for his team by grabbing of the fourth place. The points stood: Army 5, Palama 3, Outrigger 2, and "Y" 1.

Jack Scholtz put up two beautiful exhibitions in the century and furlong trials, finishing first in his heats without having to exert himself. His form was well near perfect but he was content to lay back and run with the field for the large part of the races and did not attempt to make fast times. He hit for :10 2-5 in the 100, running against a strong head wind, and made :23 3-5 in the furlong.

### OUT FOR RECORD

Tomorrow will be another day and with the finals, Scholtz will step out in a double attempt to lower the standing Hawaiian records. That he will succeed is the general belief expressed by fans who witnessed his workouts at the Kamehameha track yesterday, when he led his fields without an apparent effort.

Bernard Farden gamely attempted to comeback after pulling a ligament last week and although he placed in his heat of the 100 yards, he will probably be forced to scratch. The old injury was opened up again and he was obliged to withdraw from the 220 yards. His running in the century was strong until the halfway mark when his leg pulled on him and he was forced to struggle in to place third in his heat. Dick Penhallow the other Hawaiian valid succeeded in placing without doing apparent injury to himself and will be in condition to run Saturday.

### WOMEN FEATURE

The events for women brought out a large field from Kalia, McKinley, Punahoa and Palama, and the finals tomorrow should produce fast and exciting races in both the sprint and the hurdle events.
