

Track Records Fall As The Varsity and Palama Athletes Divide Honors

Outriggers Lose Out When Officials Allow Protest In the Medley Relay; Six Records Broken and One Tied; Hooper and Fernandez In Exhibitions of Gameness

Six records were broken, one was tied and half a dozen rules were discussed pro and con at the second annual Rainbow Relay Carnival held at Kamehameha field Saturday afternoon.

Latest reports from the conference of officials place the Palama and University of Hawaii track teams in a tie for first honors with 66 points each while the Outrigger

The events were run off in a snappy manner and the entire program had been presented by 4:30 p. m. But officials, athletes and volunteer advisers remained on the lot to argue over various technicalities which arose during the meet and by the time announcement of decisions was made most of the spectators were putting on the final touches to keep their dinner appointments.

The big argument arose over the medley relay, the claim being that Burton Hooper, Outrigger star distance man, "cut in" on the army miler near the finish of the race without having the required two yards lead over his opponent.

The protest was allowed by the officials, which disqualified the Outrigger team and gave the 10 points to the Army. Had the race not been protested, Outrigger would have been tied with the Varsity and Palama teams for first honors in the meet.

Big Surprise

The big surprise of the meet was the showing made by the Army and Outrigger athletes. The Army especially made a fine showing, collecting 38 points in various events. The Y. M. C. A. team got two points, while the National Guard athletes did not score.

As far as performances of the athletes was concerned the meet was a complete success. One record after another was toppled over and good marks were made in practically every event.

Loss of Nerve

Two athletes, Burton Hooper of the Outrigger team, and Eddie Fernandez, one of the Dean stars, gave great exhibitions of gameness during the meet. Hooper's performance consisted of running in three events in rapid succession, including the mile run twice.

A few minutes after running the last half mile lap in the two mile relay, assisting his team to set up a new record, Hooper came through as the anchor man on the Outrigger's four mile relay team. In the very next event, the medley relay, Hooper again ran the mile and finished first, although his team was disqualified. Hooper showed that he is in fine condition and it should be a great race next Saturday when he runs against Castanha and Stone in the mile event at the A. A. U. championship meet.

Eddie Fernandez's exhibition of nerve came in the half mile relay when he carried the stick out of the 220 yard laps despite the fact that he had to run with one leg bandaged from the ankle to the knee.

Fernandez was leading in the 220 yard hurdles when he strained a ligament in his leg. He managed to finish third in this race despite his injury and then came back and helped his team to win the half mile relay, giving the Deans enough points to place them in a tie for first honors in the meet.

Best Tasska

Ray Mellin, Punahou athlete, running under the colors of the Outrigger Club, robbed the Palama squad of the meet when he nosed out Tasska for second place in the half mile relay. Tasska, Palama star, was given the club with a lead over Mellin, but the Outrigger sprint star was in rare form and nosed Tasska out at the tape.

Kahler Starred

While various runners were grabbing laurels on the track, Kahler of the Army team led in the field events when he set a new record of 132 feet 9 inches for the discus throw. In competition Kahler won the event with a toss of 125 feet 4 inches, which was a new record. He then was given extra trials to try for a better mark. Each time the Army athlete threw the discus he set a new mark, finally quitting after he had raised the record to 134 feet 9 inches.

- Four mile relay—Palama (Vannalies, Kahoaiwa, Stone and Castanha) 19 minutes 51 4-5 seconds.
- Broad jump—Ching (Varsity) 21 feet 8 inches (carnival record).
- Quarter mile relay—Outrigger (Yap, Danford, Coleman and Mellin) 4:2-5 seconds. (Ties record.)

Given Treat

Jackson Scholz, national sprint champion, gave the spectators a treat with exhibitions in the 100 yards novice event and the half mile relay. Scholz ran the 100 yards novice in the first heat and was unofficial clocked at 24-5 seconds, finishing three or four yards ahead of the next man. He also ran the first 220 yards in the half mile relay. He hit a fast pace during part of the run and walked away from the local lads until he got on the brakes.

Next Saturday at the A. A. U. meet Scholz will run in the 100 and 220 events and the local sprint stars will have a chance to show what they can do against the chap who defeated Charley Padlock.

Several star athletes were unable to compete Saturday because of injuries. Dick Penhallow and Bernard Farden, sprinters, were on the sidelines because of torn ligaments in their legs, injuries received during practice. The same thing kept Dick Gearty, champion pole vaulter, out of the finals. Captain Lehman, who held the discus record until Kahler smashed it, was also out of competition because of a strained back. It may be able to compete next Saturday.

A fairly large crowd of spectators

attended the relay carnival and a larger crowd is expected next Saturday. The meet was run off fast and there were no long delays between events as has often happened at meets in the past.
