

Disqualification Puts Outrigger Out of The Running For Top Honor

Burt Hooper, Competing in Third Race of Day, Chucked Out of Medley for Alleged Foul; Many Records Fall During Afternoon's Competition

The second annual Rainbow Relay Carnival ended in a tie between the Deans, champions in 1925, and Palama—and an argument that waxed hot into the shades of darkness, after Burt Hooper, hero of the carnival, had been ruled out for an alleged foul in the medley relay, which he had won without an apparent effort, for Outrigger.

The disqualification of the beach combers in the medley relay sent the meeting into a tie between the Varsity and Palama and prevented the Outrigger club from sharing an equal amount of glory with the two winners. Had the race been allowed to stand as it finished, and there was every reason for so doing, the final standing would have seen Varsity, Palama and O.C.C. in a triple tie for the highest honor. But the final decision went against the combers and the final score put Varsity and Palama ahead by a good margin.

The island record was set during yesterday's meet, one was tied, another was established and one relay carnival mark was shot. New marks were established in the two-mile relay by Outrigger; four-mile relay by Palama; six-mile by the Mobis of Palama; six-mile by Kahler of Army; and javelin by Jim Cruickshank of Outrigger. Ching's beach jump mark went for a carnival mark, and the time for the Outrigger medley relay team established a new record, but it is doubtful whether this will be allowed to stand in view of the fact that the team was tossed out in the cold.

HOOPER IS HERO
While Varsity and Palama won the carnival with a total of 66 points each, it was Burt Hooper who was the outstanding feature of the championship relay meet—and incidentally the hero of the competition.

Hooper, running for Outrigger, took the baton on the final lap of the two-mile relay, and helped his mates set up a new mark of 8:20.5. He came back shortly after to run the anchor position on the four-mile team, and held the second place position handed him by Jorgensen, running number three for the combers. Without taking the usual rest, and without so much as a rub down, this same slim diacetylar star stepped onto the track, leading the four-mile grid, and ran the anchor position on the Outrigger medley relay team and finished first!

And while he covered himself with glory by dogging the Army anchor runner for the first time in years, and while his final spurt on the last furlong carried him to the front by nearly 300 yards, he was disqualified for "cutting in" on the Army man as he passed him. Other charges and penalties charges later served to make the argument interesting and draws out till long after the close of the meet, but the final decision went against Hooper, and while he remains a hero in the eyes of the large crowd that filled the stands at Kamehameha field he was robbed of the glory of a double victory and a record fairly established.

RELAYS DIVIDED
The relay honors were well divided with the Deans and Outrigger each taking two, and Palama and Army grabbing one apiece. The fights for first places in the team events were hotly contested, and produced thrilling finishes in almost every event.

The Palama four-mile relay competition, consisting of Vanvalles, Kahoaiwal, Stone and Castanza, had slipped through to a new mark in an event by covering the long distance in 19:51.5. The Palms took the lead at the outset, when Vanvalles established distance for his mates. Kahoaiwal increased it, and Stone and Castanza finished strong, bringing the mark down below the 20-minute figure. The race was pushed, the record would have undoubtedly been many seconds under that established yesterday.

COMBERS WIN
The surprise of the afternoon was the victory of Outrigger over Palama and the Deans in the six-mile relay. The combers picked up in the last two changes of the race when Coleman and Mellin sprang up the spurs between the tied shirted team and the Whitted "P" quartet, and the former took the top in 44:5.5, which tied the record held by Varsity. Bernie Farden, O. C. C. star, and Dick Penhall, Varsity sprinter, were unable to compete owing to leg ligaments sustained in practice.

Farden, regarded as Hawaii's fastest sprint possibility, may be permanently out of track competition owing to the seriousness of his injury. His wounds were mended yesterday on stretches. Dick Garlands, a valid champion of the islands,

was also unable to enter the finals yesterday when a blood clot developed around a leg ligament, following a supposedly slight injury sustained in the trials last Thursday.

DEANS WIN
The Varsity quartet won the mile relay as expected when Mountcastle, Fernandez, Ching and Thompson ran out in front all the way. Their time of 3:34.5 was slower than the record, but was enough to defeat the team from Palama which finished second. Outrigger's two-mile relay quartet, composed of Low, Greig, Medeiros and Hooper, won and in record time, with the beach champion running his lap in 2:04 and Greig duplicating the feat.

Army took its relay victory as a result of the disqualification of Outrigger in the medley event. Palama was given second and the Deans third.

The half-mile relay was a thriller all the way with Ted Hair flashing across in a beautiful finish some yards in front of Mellin and Tashka, leader of Outrigger and Palama respectively, who were given second and third places.

DOUBT EXPRESSED
Some doubt was expressed by fans who were on the finish line as to the correctness of the decision rendered in this event, many claiming that Tashka had fallen into a tie with the O. C. C. star for second place. The decision of the judges was sustained however, and Palama did not question the verdict. Had the Palama team ended on a tie for second in the event, the meet would have gone to the west-end of town with the Deans second.

MELLIN STARS
Ray Mellin came in for a large share of the spot light when he flashed home in front of Jimmie Whittle of Palama and Eddie Fernandez of Varsity in the 200-yard low hurdles, when the dope pointed to a victory for the Deans star. Mellin took the lead with the gun and finished a good yard ahead of Whittle who was second. They took the last hurdle together but Mellin's sprinting power gave him the verdict.

Mellin's work was cut out for him in the quarter-mile relay, when he was required to step into Farden's shoes and hold down the anchor position for O. C. C. Mellin came through with relays flying and enabled his team to tie the present mark. In the half-mile relay he regained ground lost by a bad passing of the stick on the third lap, and his final lunge apparently carried him over the line ahead of Tashka of the Pala. It was the closest finish of the day and left the fans in an uproar for an hour after the meet had run its course.

YOUNGSTERS WIN
Correia and Andrade of Palama finished an early afternoon thrill when they took pole vault honors away from Harvey and Cooke, of Outrigger. Harvey, the favorite with Gartley out, was unable to beat his rival after the bar was raised to 11 feet. Luis gave the Pala another first place by defeating Gannon and Carter in the high jump with a leap of 5 feet 9 inches. Ching of the Varsity stables took the broad jump on his showing in the trials, refraining from jumping yesterday in order to save himself for the half-mile relay event. Lomes went into second place over Hops and Ault was fourth after jumping

GERDES WINS 100
The 100-yard novice event went to Joe Gerdes of Varsity brow yard, when he defeated Coleman of Outrigger, Luis, Palama, was third and Brown, Varsity, fourth. The time was 10:3.5.
