

RAINBOW RELAY CARNIVAL DRAWS STARS

The field of entries in the Rainbow Relay Carnival, scheduled for April 10, is one of the classiest ever to be registered with a local A. A. U. committee. Already the clubs intending to take part in Hawaii's great relay carnival, are lining up their material, and the competition this year promises to be harder fought than ever before.

While the individual events will see a few outstanding stars in action, the relays will be a feature of practically ever star who has performed on the track here, this year and in the past.

Palama has strengthened its ranks materially; the Outrigger appears to be a well balanced squad; the Varsity will be a strong as ever; and the Army is going to send a powerful array of talent in for the Rainbow and the A. A. U. tilts.

There should be no trouble in making expenses this year. The prep track meets demonstrated to the fans that a meet can be conducted fast and efficiently, and the present A. A. U. track and field committee is already well established as a high powered organization. We look for banner crowds at both meets.

KEEP COMPETITORS IN TENTS

A RULE that might be laid down to good advantage by the A. A. U. committee, Otto Klum, chairman, is the one which would keep all participants in meets in their tents until their respective events have been called.

This is the custom that is followed on the mainland and while it prevents the athlete from viewing the events of the meet, other than his own, it enables him to rest before his event, and also gives the officials a chance to work with a clear field and track.

Coaches, too, are prevented from certain sections of the field on the mainland, but there has never been any trouble encountered from allowing them to have a free run of the area here, and there seems little necessity of barring them.

CLIFFORD MELIM IN HARNESS

CLIFFORD MELIM, one of Hawaii's fastest sprinters of a decade ago, is back in harness again and is training for the Rainbow meet and the A. A. U. championships.

While Melim has lost much of his ability to get a flying start and is not quite as spry as he was about eight years ago, he is still in class with the fastest men here, and will have to be reckoned with on the days of the big meets.

He is training faithfully on Alexander Field and will perform under the colors of the Outrigger Club.
