There is something of the real spirit of amateur athletics in their characters, something of the same thing that Paavo Nurmi drove home in his visit to America . . . that an amateur athlete should perform because of his love of the game, and not for what he can get out of it in the way of incidental expenses.

True enough that only second cabin reservations were available on the Ventura, but neither of the two men has asked for hotel expenses on the coast, cab fares or other items. They are going to make the trip just as economical as possible, and if they do not win a single event their example in the matter of the journey will have done a power of good for local athletics.
