

New Javelin and Shot-Put Records Made In Hawaiian A. A. U. Trials Yesterday

Wise Regains Spear Title and Clark Better His Own Mark Made In Rainbow Relay For Tossing the Iron Apple; Tryout Much Delayed Due To Lack of Officials

Island athletes seem to be coming forward in field events more rapidly than on the track. In the trials, yesterday afternoon at Kamehameha field, for the Hawaiian A. A. U. meet to be staged tomorrow, Willie Wise regained the javelin throwing championship and set a new island record of 164 feet 4 inches and Herman Clark broke his own island mark for the shot-put by tossing the iron marble 43 ft. 2½ in.

There was a lot of delay in running off the trials yesterday. The athletes were on hand but some of the officials failed to show up and the work did not get under way until after 4:30 p. m. Trouble developed in the high hurdles event and one heat will be run over tomorrow.

Wise lost his javelin title to Jim Cruickshank at the Rainbow Relay games when his teammate from the University of Hawaii tossed the spear 163 feet. Yesterday Wise took it back with 164 feet 4 inches. Cruickshank, O. Dawson, G. Dawson and Richards qualified.

In the shot-put Herman Clark's record of a week ago was 42 feet 8¾ inches and he broke that by 5¾ inches. Farden, Richards, Kaaua and Gomes qualified.

Capt. Lehman of the 27th Infantry won the finals in the hammer-throw yesterday with a toss of 110 feet 1 inch. The island record is 128 feet 5 inches made by R. A. Ladlum in 1917.

In the hammer-throw Jim Cruickshank was second, Frank Kanoe third and Theodore Searle was fourth.

Other Field Events

Those who qualified in the pole vault at 10 feet 6 inches were Gartley, Harvey and Snyder for the Outrigger club, Correa and Akana for Palama and Wicke for the Deans.

throw with 117 feet 4½ inches. His own island record is 117 feet 8 inches made last Saturday. Farden, O'Sullivan, Clark and Fernandez qualified.

In the high jump at five feet five inches Holt, Luis and Whittle qualified for Palama, Hartman and W. Holt for the Deans, Apo and Sato for the Guard and Carter for the Outrigger. The latter holds the island record at 5 feet 11¼ inches.

Eddie Fernandez took the first heat in the 220-yard low hurdles in :26 2-5 with Melim and Costa next. Lee, Whittle and Morse ran over the course to qualify.

Ching of the Deans did 21 feet 5 inches in the broad jump and Lemes was second with 21 feet 1 inch. Correa, Belland Ault also qualified. The record is 21 feet 11 3-4 inches held by Simmons.

Farden Stars

B. Farden won his heat in the 220 yards in :22 3-5, easily beating Jones and Penhallow. Ted Hair of the Deans took his heat in the same time, beating Tasaka and Deverill. Farden nosed out Jones, Penhallow and Chun for the century in :10 1-5. Ching took the second heat in the same time with Searle, Freitas and Tasaka placing. Beamer, Ho and Johnson ran the course to qualify in the third heat.

Akau of the Deans nosed out John Watt in the first heat of the 120-yard high hurdles with Lansing third. The time was :17 flat. In the second heat Referee Bert Tarleton ruled that Johnny Morse, who finished first in :16 3-5, had failed to properly clear some of the hurdles with his right foot. There was some talk about the hurdles not being standard but since they were the ones used in the Rainbow relays as satisfactory this point seemed to have little weight. Finally to settle the matter it was decided to run the heat over again tomorrow.

There were no heats in the 440-yard dash as only nine answered the call. Landers, Giles and Deverill will represent Outrigger in the finals; Fernandez, Montcastle, Thompson and Bruce Cruickshank will run for the Deans; and Robertson, 27th Infantry, and Houghtailing, Palama, will compete for their clubs.

With a heat in the 120-high hurdles yet to be run, the three leading clubs qualified in the following order: University, 23; Palama, 22; Outrigger, 18. The Guard has six men and the 27th Infantry two. Points from the hammer-throw give the Wolfhounds five, University four and Palama two.
