

University Of Hawaii Wins By 32-Point Margin While Outrigger Club Is Second

Shattering of Half-Mile Relay Record Made By 25th Infantry Eight Years Ago Is Outstanding Performance At Kam Field Saturday; Palama Is Third

There is nothing that a crowd of Honolulu fans like better than to see records broken and had the fans known that the first annual Rainbow Relay Carnival Saturday at Kamehameha field was to see half a dozen island marks crumble they would have been present in large numbers. But nobody expected many records or even any records to fall, and as a result there was only a fair to middling crowd on hand to view the performance. And a remarkable performance it was, too, with the University of Hawaii copping top honors by making 87 points, the Outriggers next with 55 points and Palama third with 47 points.

Of course each individual fan can read the sport writers and ask why the writers did not predict something before the meet. Sure, like it or not, the writers, they're used to being panned, anyway!

But honestly, what scribbles would have been foolish enough, or rash enough, to predict a new island record in the half-mile relay which stood at 1:12 1/2 ever since the celebrated 25th Infantry team set it in 1917 or thereabouts. Yet that record was one of those which fell Saturday when the University of Hawaii team consisting of W. Montcastle, Dick Penhallow, Eddie Fernandez and E. H. Hair, turned in a time of 1:07 flat. The outrigger canoe club team had much to do with this. The surf-screw quartet of R. Mellin, H. Deverill, A. Giles and W. Jones made the Deans step some to nose out at the finish in record time. And Hair, who ran the last lap for the University, and Bill Jones, who stepped in for the Outriggers, deserve particular credit. That Hair fellow surely ran like the w. k. scared hare. He will bear a lot of watching, for he has the making of a great sprinter.

New Spear Champ
Coming back to this business of records, who would have been bold enough last Friday to predict that Jim Cruckshank was going to become the new Hawaiian javelin throwing champion and beat Willie Wain's record of 161 feet 10 inches made last year by heaving the spear 157 feet and that in the teeth of a stiff breeze? Cruckshank was only a fairly good javelin hurler last year but now—look out!

And further, who locally ever heard of Capt. H. G. Lehman of the 27th Infantry until Saturday when he tossed the discus for 157 feet 3 inches and knocked the stuffings out of Pong's island record of 116 feet 6 1/2 inches made in 1927?

Then there was the mile relay. The University of Hawaii was not even expected to win this. The Outrigger team consisting of V. Danford, A. Giles, Jim Landers and H. Deverill was looked upon as a favorite. Yet the surfers came second and the University of Hawaii four, W. Montcastle, H. Thompson, B. Cruckshank and Eddie Fernandez breezed to a new record of 3:32 flat, whereas the best previous island time made in the Cornell games for this distance had been 3:37 1/2.

Four Miles
True enough the scribbles might have taken a chance and predicted a new mark for the four-mile relay and they would have been right. With Burten Hooper running anchor for the Outrigger team and W. Castanha for the Palamas there was almost certain to be a new record. Still nobody ever dreamed that Sanders, third lap man for the surfers, was the marvel he proved to be or that T. Thomas and J. Sweeney, one and two men, would give Sanders and Hooper so much headway that there would practically be no race at all. And that's what they did for Hooper finished his race just about even with Castanha as the later started on his third.

Incidentally the Outriggers made 20 minutes and 19 seconds and beat the Punahou team island mark made in 1921 of 20 minutes and 23 seconds.

The other record fell in the trials Thursday when Herman Clarke of the National Guard Athletic Club put the shot 42 feet 8 1/2 inches, nullifying M. De Mello's 1923 mark of 41 feet 7 inches. Clarke won the event Saturday but did not come up to his Thursday performance.

A Star
This man Lehman from the 27th Infantry was just about a team in himself, for besides breaking the record in the discus and winning that event he also took the final in the hammer throw Thursday, thus making a total of 19 points and getting the highest individual honors of the meet. It was a relay meet and relay points cannot be given any one man of a winning team, otherwise Eddie Fernandez

of the University of Hawaii would have stood higher than second. For Eddie won the 220 low hurdles, was second in the discus and ran laps on two winning relay teams.

Easy Win
By the way Eddie's victory in the 220 yards low hurdles was a bit of a surprise because the dopsters had just about decided that the affair would be entirely between Mellin and Morse. Eddie finished with yards to spare and the others ended in a heap.

Tough Luck
Johnny Morse was a sorely disappointed young man in the 120-yard high hurdles. He crossed the finishing line first, a good five yards ahead of Akai, but there were four hurdles down in Johnny's lane and the officials had to disqualify him. It is justice to him it must be said that the wind was exceedingly stiff and at least one hurdle went down, the officials decided, through being accidentally touched by the fellow-foot of another hurdler, John Watt, former holder of the world record for 440-yard high hurdles, got second place. Akai of the University nailing him out in the stretch. Watt has only had a few weeks training which accounts for his showing.

Thomas was given third place because Robinson of the 27th Infantry was disqualified for knocking down too many hurdles and Poepe of the University got the lone point for fourth place.

The novice century was a race between "Pump" Searle and Hair. The latter won by a hair if a pun is permitted while Searle was one pump behind. Ching, another University man, came third which made a nice cleanup for the Deans in this number.

Watch Him
Milton Carter of the Outrigger had been regarded as almost certain winner in the high jump but a "dark horse" from the Deans' stable bobbed up named W. Hartman who not only won the event but came within one-quarter inch of Carter's island record made last year. Hartman's dives over the bar gave the spectators a real thrill. He was well worth watching and will bear more watching to the future.

Dick Gartley of the Outrigger was a favorite in the pole vault and came through as expected by winning the event. Harold Harvey, a teammate, was second. The top height was somewhat below the

record but in view of the little training he has had this season Gartley's work was excellent.

H. W. Ching of the university came within 1/4 inch of the broad jump record, which was a creditable performance. The prep school men, competing for various clubs, did not show up well in this event, second place going to Tremblay of the 12th Field Artillery.

Good Race
In the two-mile relay it was the work of W. Castanha in the third lap which enabled Palama to take first place. The first lap ended with them in second place. In the third Castanha left the rest of the field and gave Kabeawa enough margin to finish easily in front. The Deans came second. The Outrigger had one slow man and he allowed the other team to get so far ahead that despite the good work of the Ault brothers the surfers had to be content with third place.


The quarter mile relay was a speedy race. Freitas and Giles both got a margin and Jones added to it so that Farden finished in front without a great deal of opposition. Penhallow made a game effort to catch Farden but the lead was too great. It was close enough, however, to be thrilling and the crowd certainly got its share of thrills Saturday.

Good Work
The officials in charge gave the crowd one thrill by working so rapidly that the tourney was over before 4:15 o'clock, which breaks all Hawaiian records for snapping through a meet. Another record was broken by Col. Adna G. Clark and his R. O. T. C. men, who kept the field so well patrolled that only the working officials and competitors got in, which also thrilled the crowd in the stands, for the absence of a lot of young fans hiding the field events was greatly appreciated.

Coach Otto Klum expressed himself as satisfied with the way the meet had gone, and well he might be since his team had made the largest number of points. He remarked that this was, of course, the first Rainbow relay carnival and that he hoped to see a bigger crowd present next year when the rest of the local fans got to know what the Rainbow relay carnival means.

As has been remarked before, the University of Hawaii does not lose an athletic event when the rainbow shines in the valley. It was sunshine most of the afternoon but just about 3:30 a cloud bank gathered up at the head of Kalia Valley and threw a rainbow on the scene, but most of the Deans athletes were too busy piling up points to notice it more than casually. The Deans wore white sweaters and on the breast was a diamond with the colors of the rainbow.
