

Harold Harvey Is Picked As Captain and Manager Of Team Is Ralph Ault

Wealth of Stars On Surfing Club Track and Field Team; Plenty of Entries Assure Success of Big Meet At Kam Field Next Saturday; Trials On Thursday

The Outrigger Canoe Club's track and field team on paper looks like the strongest entry in the first annual Rainbow Relay Carnival to be staged under the auspices of the University of Hawaii at Kamehameha field next Saturday afternoon. The Outriggers at a meeting yesterday elected Harold Harvey captain of the team and Ralph Ault the manager.

The meeting yesterday reviewed the club's prospects of winning and came to the conclusion that the surfing club stands more than an even chance of coping the honors.

It has John Watt, former world record breaker in hurdles, and Ray Melim, the Punahou star, for the hurdle events. Melim will also be in the novice sprint, as will Bill Jones, Punahou wonder. Burton Hooper, well known miler, will be on one of the relay teams.

Dick Gartley, holder of the island pole vault record, is almost certain to capture his event. Milton Carter won the high jump last year at the A. A. U. track meet and will be in that event again. Besides Hooper, the club has such men as Herbert Deverill and Gordon May for its short distance relays.

All in all the Outriggers have the pick of the islands entered under their colors.

Official announcement was made this morning that trials will be held on Thursday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at Kamehameha field in the following events:

Shot-put, 120. low hurdles, 120 high hurdles, discus, javelin, pole vault, high jump, broad jump, 100 yards novice and hammer throw. The finals in the hammer throw will also be staged. Drawing for lanes for the relays will also take place.
