

ISLAND TRACK STARS MAY GO TO NATIONAL TRACK TOURNEY AT PASADENA ON JULY 4TH

Hawaiian athletes may go to the National Track and Field championships to be staged by the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States at Pasadena, California, in the month of July.

George ("Dad") Center, president of the Hawaiian A. A. U., has received word from Robert S. Weaver of Los Angeles, president of the national A. A. U., to the effect that the Pasadena people have given him \$5000 to bring athletes to the meet which he declares will be the greatest athletic spectacle outside of the Olympic games.

The Hawaiian track and field games on March 26 will be in the nature of a tryout for the Pasadena tourney. Island athletes who show well a week from Saturday will be considered as possibilities for the trip in summer.

Big Entry

More than 100 athletes will compete in the coming meet at Alexander field and some fast times are expected. Clifford Melim, the island wonder in the sprints, is regarded as a possibility. At Schofield they have uncovered a marvel so reports say, who is a burner in the century dash. Kamehameha school also has a speedy runner in the short distances.

John Watt of the Outrigger club, holder of the 440 yards high hurdles world mark, is another local star who may be sent over. Watt sprained a tendon in Europe and was unable to compete in the Olympic games but he will try for a record in the 220 hurdles at the local meet March 26.

Details

Weaver of Los Angeles writes that he is busy with the details of the national games and has assurance that teams will be sent from

clubs in all parts of the country including the Chicago Athletic association, the New York Athletic club, Boston Athletic club, Illinois Athletic club, the Multnomah club of Portland, Oregon, the Olympic club of San Francisco and the Los Angeles Athletic club.

By holding the meet in July, Weaver believes that there will be many entries from the colleges. He says that it is his view that past annual meets were held too late in the season.

"Dad" Center is asked to advise the national A. A. U. as to what local athletes are stars enough likely to making a showing in the Pasadena meet. The information is desired by Weaver so that he can allot some money to Hawaii for the traveling expenses of such stars as may be sent from here.
