

WAIKIKI ATHLETIC CLUB WINS TRACK AND FIELD MEET OF SECOND ANNUAL TERRITORIAL FAIR, KAPIOLANI PARK

Herman Clark Breaks Shot-Put Record, the Only One To Go By the Board—Events Pulled Off in Rapid-Fire Order—Attendance Small—Out-rigger Team Lands Second Place—McKenzie Athletes Capture Silver Cup

The Waikiki Athletic Club came to life again yesterday, thanks to the big interest taken in it by G. Stanley McKenzie, who has maintained the organization together, and carried off the A. A. U. track and field meet of the Second Annual Territorial Fair at Kapiolani Park.

The Red "W" athletes piled up a total of 62 out of the grand total of 129 points for the entire meet, taking first place from "Dad" Center's Outrigger Athletic Club by 13 points, the latter coming second in the meet with 49 points.

The other clubs finished in the following order, as to points: Boys' Clubs, 8; Palama Settlement, 5; Industrial School of Waialeale, 5; Unattached, 5; Fort Kanehama, 2; 12th Cavalry, 1; Fort De Russy, 1; Navy, 1. Included in the outrigger score are six points made in the midjet relay and running high jump.

"I am both pleased and proud with the showing the Waikikis made in this meet," said Manager McKenzie yesterday. "We proved that baseball and kindred athletics engaged in by the men of my club go a long way to help in a track and field meet."

Mr. McKenzie was unstinted in praise of the great work done by Harry Chilton, trainer, coach, sub-manager and general utility assistant of the club.

"When you have Harvey with you you have one-half of the points assured in advance of any meet, track and field or swimming, it matters not which," McKenzie said.

"Dad" Center's Outrigger athletes also made a great showing and though they came in second place, Mr. Center was satisfied with their work.

"We are gradually putting the Outrigger Athletic Club on the sports map and when we meet the Waikikis again expect the story will be told in a different way," the Outrigger captain said.

Herman Clark of the Waikikis broke the only record to go by the board yesterday when he put the 16-pound shot 30 feet and 7 inches, three inches better than the Hawaiian A. A. U. record set by Sergeant Carlons of the 25th Infantry, made in June, 1918. It was fully expected that Clark would do but he did yesterday, for the stalwart Kan athlete had given previous indication of this in practice.

Some of the finishes were close and exciting, particularly in the century dash, in which Kan Leong, Raymond Long and In Bunn Hee, all of the Waikikis, finished almost in a dead heat. Kenneth Decker of the Outriggers was good fourth, having much his own way over the rest of the field.

In the broad jump Kan Leong and Leal were tied for quite a while. In the work for a decision Kan Leong eventually gained first place, second going to Leal.

Arona made a good try for the 220-yard high hurdles record, but fell shy of being John M. Watt's time by four-fifths of a second. Arona knocked over the last hurdle. This, however, did not disqualify him. "Wild Bill" Leal was a good second in this event.

Crozier had his own way in the half-mile run, while Joe Stickney did well in coming second. This was also the order of finish for first and second places in the quarter-mile.

In Bunn Hee won the 220-yard dash practically hands down, being quite a number of yards ahead of Decker. The midjet relay was interesting, but it would have been much better if more clubs had entered.

Unattached Win Mile
Ishimura, running unattached, was an easy winner in the mile.

The boys' clubs 400-yard relay was good. Frank Telles established a Hawaiian record in the running high dive. He tried for the world's record, but failed, although in practice he has gone an inch or two over the record height.

The Waikikis won the half-mile relay with much ease, each man on the team having it on the other runners. These teams were made up as follows: Waikikis—Hay Kong, Kan Leong, In Bunn Hee and Arona; Outrigger—Crozier, Harvey, Leal and Decker; 12th Cavalry—Hollenbeck, Childer, McDonald and Hart; First Hawaiian—Zablas, Haraha, Osano and Yoshida.

Lindley tried to break or equal Elisha S. Anders' record of 11 feet and 8 inches in the pole vault, but could go only 10 feet and 9 inches.

Kan Leong and Crozier won two first places each, but Kan Leong was the biggest individual point winner of the meet, for he took a fourth place in the running high jump. He also came in for a fourth interest in the relay race, all of which gave him a total of 12 1/2 points.

Kan Leong 2 firsts and one second; Crozier, two firsts; In Bunn Hee, one first and one third; Ishimura, Arona, Frank Telles, Harvey, W. Clark and Lindley one first place each, Lindley also getting one third place; Stickney and W. Leal got each two second places; Decker got one second and one fourth; Hipsa a second, a third and a fourth; Mahu, Auerbach, Coleman and McCandless, one second place each; Kinney came in for two third places; Perritt, Genichi, Crabbe, Pin En Ing, Granrose and C. Luis, one third place each, Luis also getting one fourth place; Ollie, Geo. Stofko, Barton, C. Baldwin, R. Choong and Homer, one fourth place each.

Holding a track and field meet on Friday, the thirteenth, seems to have some sort of a disadvantage, for the grandstand attendance was very small, no more than 250 people being there. There was quite a sprinkling of fans on the bleachers.

Rapid Fire Work
The big feature of the meet was that it was run ahead of the time schedule, coming to a close fully half an hour earlier than programmed. There were no delays and waits, the events following each other in rapid-fire order.

Starker Vitecos was again very much on the job and got the athletes away to a fine start in every instance, and was but twice being compelled to call them back.

The officials of the meet were as published in The Advertiser yesterday and all did good work.

The Waikiki Athletic Club won the beautiful silver cup put up by the Territorial Fair Commission for the team making the most points at the meet. Gold, silver and bronze medals were awarded in each event to the four place men, first, second, third and fourth. The presentation was made after the meet by Major Harry Murray.

Hence, through the kindness of the racing committee of the Territorial Fair, Robert Horner, chairman, the three races named will be added to today's program of originally scheduled events.
