We had good pupus and drinks and even a nice custom made birthday cake for a couple of players celebrating their birthdays the day of. Allin-all, it was another beautiful day of golf for our group and an awesome and successful tournament to wrap up our year of golf for our OCC members!

As our committee year, and my term as President, come to a close, it was a natural time to reflect on the previous 12 months. Saying it was eventful would be an understatement but I say that with a smile.

To borrow from Charles Dickens, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times" when considering how the year began and how differently the year ended. The challenges of the beginning of 2017 are well-documented and an unenviable window of time for any private club let alone our particularly tight knit membership.

The meetings and number of hours invested between February and July by senior leadership may be unprecedented in our Club's modern history. I say this less to be dramatic but more so to convey the commitment level demonstrated by a host of leaders throughout our Club's membership as well as several key staff members.

The long list of 2017 positive's include a comprehensive plan initiated for our seawall and beach, locker room renovations prepared, launch of the Club's App, great performance by the women's paddling program, better-than-expected results from the men's paddling program, the launch of an advanced junior paddling program, rollout of digital voting, and major organizational strides by Shannon Pelkey as our Athletic Director.

These are some of the more noticeable items contributing to the solid finish of 2017, but there is also a tremendous amount of work being done on less-visible fronts to shore up the fundamentals of the Club for years ahead. As the Board and committees are able to adequately vet these various projects, you will see much more on them.

Although this year had a difficult beginning, 2017 was ultimately a great year for resolving problems and restoring a healthy trajectory on a number of major fronts.

In recent years there has been considerable heavy lifting done by senior leadership at both the Board and committee levels. I have had a unique vantage point for seeing just how dedicated these groups are in the betterment of our Club. Some of this is focused on what you see and experience today but much of it is concentrated on ensuring we are relevant in the future - this is critical if our grandchildren are going to enjoy Outrigger as "best in class".

Trust your leadership - they are tirelessly working to make this legacy a reality. The work these members are doing gives us all much to be grateful for as the mantle not only gets carried forward but done so with such capable and visionary leadership.

It has been a busy year for committees, management, the Board, ad hocs, etc. Most of you likely know a few fellow members who have invested significant time in 2017 - take a moment when you see them to say mahalo. We should be honoring these members.

On a parting note, this is my final article as President and I wanted to express my thanks for the support I received this year. The emails, texts, notes, voicemails and conversations I had with so many of you throughout 2017 made navigating through those first six months less daunting. Further, it made celebrating the high points of 2017 even better as we emerged into a far better place. Onward and upward - mahalo nui!



Historical Committee Adds 40 Oral Histories to Archives

Outrigger Canoe Club means different things to different people. For some it's a place to bring their children and share intergenerational activities with their families. For others it's a place to whet their competitive juices, as they engage in intra- and inter-club activities. And to others, it's a great place to soak up the sun, entertain their friends, and enjoy the great view.

Every one of our members has a story to tell and the Historical Committee has been busy collecting these stories in a series of oral histories to preserve them as part of the Club's history.

Interviewers Barbara Del Piano and Marilyn Kali interviewed 40 members in 2017 for the Oral History Program, which began in 1968.

"We've heard so many fun stories," says Barbara. "We especially love hearing the stories from people, now in their 60s, 70s, and 80s, who grew up at the old Club in Waikiki, and remember the Beach Boys, and Duke and Dad Center."

"History comes to life when you're talking to someone who was sitting on a winning Molokai crew, or playing their first volleyball game on Daddy's Court, or having Cline Mann buying them their first legal drink at the Bar," adds Marilyn.

"One of the things we always ask, is what has being a member of Outrigger meant to you. The answers are so heart-felt and emotional, as members share their love of the Club," she added.

All of the interviews are videographed by Hugo deVries of Hot-Pixels, and the finished interviews can be viewed on the OCC Sports website: outriggercanoeclubsports.com. All of the interviews have been transcribed so you can read the transcript as well as watch the video.

Many of the older interviews from the 1960s to 2000s, were recorded on audio tapes. The committee has digitized these tapes and is adding them to the website, so you can hear the original interview as well as read the transcript.





Who Knew?

Honolulu Advertiser February 22, 1928

"While most of Honolulu was thinking in terms of inter-island aviation, three Outrigger Canoe Club canoeists demonstrated that the navigation methods of the early Hawaiians weren't so bad. For the first time in many, many years-nobody seemed to know just how many-a canoe trip was made from Waikiki Beach to Molokai.

"Edric Cook, George Forrest and James Cunningham were the three hardy seamen. The vessel was a six-paddle canoe belonging to Dad Center, having the advantage over those of the early Hawaiians, of being equipped with a Johnson outboard mo-

"The young men left the Moana pier at 7 a.m. and landed at Kooloa, Molokai, just four and one-half hours later to the

great surprise of the residents there. About an hour and a half was spent on the island, lunching and replenishing the gasoline supply of the canoe, after which, laden with a crate of pineapples presented by the Molokaians, the three started on the return trip.

"Fifteen minutes more were required to recross the channel than on the outgoing venture, and after four hours and 45 minutes the party landed at Waikiki at 5:20 p.m.


"The sea was very smooth in the middle of the channel, reported Edric Cook, but was rough on the two coast sides. Coming back in was particularly rough near Koko Head. The boys saw quite a few sharks, some of them coming within ten feet of the boat.

"Aside from a heavy coat of sunburn, the three were none the worse for their trip. The distance covered by the canoe was about 90 miles."

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors on December 14, 2017.

Executive Committee: Discussion was held regarding the proposed assistant general manager position.

Membership Count: The Membership Count was 4,853 as of November 30, 2017.

Honorary Memberships: Honorary memberships were approved for the following, through December 31, 2018: Domie Gose, Crisostomo Guzman, Annie Halliwell, Marie Riede and Gordon Smith.

Judges of Election: The following individuals were approved to serve as Judges of Elections for 2018: Gerri Pedesky and Amy Lawson Woodward (Co-Chairs), Peter Balding, Murray Hixson, John Lacy, Jimmy McMahon, Arden Moore, Gordon Smith, Rachel Ross Bradley (Observer).

Board Election Report: Lissa Guild Eveleth reviewed the communication plan put together to socialize the upcoming Board election process. We have started a significant full court press on getting the word out, and collection of as many member email addresses as we can. The procedure should be a template as to how all committees communicate to the membership.

Athletics: The request to move the Beach Desk off its current location was referred back to House and Building and Grounds Committees for planning and implementation. . . The Beach and Water Safety Committee's request to conduct a "Watersports Garage Sale" was discussed. It had too many unanswered questions before action could be taken. . . The following Special Athletic Members were renewed until December 31, 2018 per the recommendation of the Athletic Committee: Shannon O'Neill, Ali Rigg, Tyler Jaggers, Jennifer Lee, Jeremy Treskon, Antonio Miranda, Vince McCormack, Mary Margaret, Ashley Kruse, Brady Piercy, Lia Portner, Lawrence Tommy Thompson, Dave Boston, and Leighton Miyachi.

Service Membership: The Board discussed the Admissions and Membership Committee's recommendations on the adjustment of the Service membership classification.

Treasurer: Due to the earlier schedule of this Board meeting due to the holidays, the financials were not yet available for review. Jocelyn Apo is working hard to get all of her systems in place.

Operations Report: Starting with a very successful Thanksgiving, we are in the heart of the holiday season, and all is going well. . . Hosted the awards banquet for the Honolulu Marathon, for over 200 people on the beach. Many VIP's were in attendance and the host was thrilled. . . New chairs in the Hau Terrace have been accepted with positive member feedback. . . Installation of the bird screen at the Snack Shop has received positive comments, including that of the health inspector who happened to stop in for a random inspection last week. He was happy and appreciative of our initiative. . . Reviewed the schedule of the construction projects for

the week of January 27-February 3, including the closure of the garage for repaving. . . Reviewed the specifics of the accident that happened in the parking garage, with damage to a koa canoe.

Athletics: The Board was appreciative of the extent of detail in the Athletic Committee report. . . An extensive discussion took place regarding the proposal of the junior paddling program. More backup will be provided when available, as countless hours have been spent with the group on putting this together.

House: Board was apprised that lunch service in Koa Lanai will be eliminated on Tuesdays, effective February.

Long Range Planning: The preliminary story boards on the Locker Room projects were presented to the Board. The IDS Task Force is being asked to weigh in on these designs, before presenting to the Club membership. Due to scheduling, paddling season and bidding process, we do not anticipate this project starting until fall. . . The Senior Dues restructuring project is still in review, hope to have it to present to the Board in January.

Member Relations: Inquiry was made about the RFP process for the Club's comprehensive communication plan. Details to be provided in an email prior to January's meeting.

Historical: Historical Committee asked that the Club come up with a plan for our 110th anniversary in May. Was referred to Entertainment Committee.

Vice-President: Names of the candidates for next year's Vice President were announced. The Board was asked to prepare to vote at its January meeting.





