




Board Draws Praise at OCC Annual Meeting

One hundred and sixteen voting members attended the Outrigger Canoe Club Annual Meeting on February 12 in the Koa Lanai with President Anthony Hunt presiding. The meeting was consistent with the Board of Director's approach during the past year to improve communications and work more collaboratively with the membership regarding decisions being made on behalf of the Club.

Gerri Pedesky and Amy Lawson, co-chairs of the Judges of Election Committee, reported on the election for the Board of Directors saying it was the best voter turnout in recent years. Of the 1,950 eligible voters, 1,021 votes were received. This was the first time voting could be done electronically, and 371 members opted to vote that way while 650 submitted paper ballots.

Elected to new two-year terms were incumbents Robert Durkin, Bret Chuckovich, Jonathan Steiner, Michelle Luxton, and Dustin Sellers. Elected to her first two-year term was Laurie Foster. Continuing on the Board are Jenifer Bossert, Lissa Guild Eveleth, Richard Humphreys Jr., Anthony Hunt, Alice Lunt, William K. Meheula III and Rick Piper.

In his report, Hunt thanked members for "coming back to the Club" and choosing to dine here more often. He explained that the Club was running at a deficit in Food and Beverage operations for the first seven months of the year, stabilized in August, and had better than expected revenues through the rest of the year.

Hunt added that the Club's Strategic Plan (which may be viewed on the Club website) and the results of the Membership Survey, helped the Board understand what members want in our Club. He also thanked members who served on focus group committees for their input, helping clarify priorities for various constituent groups.

Highlighting other projects successfully implemented in 2017, Hunt said "Our Club's greatest assets are our three koa racing canoes, and we now have a policy and procedure for their repair and maintenance and a plan on how to safeguard them during a hurricane or tsunami." He thanked the subcommittee headed by Alice Lunt for taking the lead on this.

In a year where improving communication with the membership was a priority, Hunt touted the addition of the recently released OCC App. With the App members can receive important information and alerts, view their OCC bill, check the Club Calendar and make reservations in the dining room.

Hunt thanked members for their patience the last week of January while a new sidewalk was installed in the front entry and the driveway repaved, the 24-year-old dishwasher was replaced and other improvements on the property were performed. He estimated that the old dishwasher had washed 30 million items during its service.

Coordinating Director Bill Meheula reported on the furniture replacement project which is nearly completed and promised that a comprehensive accounting of the project will be forthcoming.

Coordinating Director Rob Durkin reported on the digital voting project which was introduced this year and deemed a success. The Board is hoping that more members engage with the Club via its digital platforms including the OCC App, Facebook, Twitter, weekly email blasts and digital voting.

Hunt gave an update on the seawall project, which has been divided into three phases: preventing the failure of the current seawall; shoring it up for the future; and finally, wave deflectors. The project is currently in the permitting stage and when permits are received, the project will move ahead.

Hunt introduced incoming president Dustin Sellers, who talked about a few of his priorities for the coming year. In addition to following through on the projects already in progress, he'd like to see the Hawaiian trio of musicians return to the Koa Lanai to serenade diners; the summer Steak Fry come back; and execute another successful Club Day in 2018.

The membership voted Life Memberships to two long-time members who have served the Club in an extraordinary manner over the years. They are Past-President Mary Philpotts McGrath and Historical Committee Chair Tay Perry. See story about them on page 5.

In the member's questions and comments part of the meeting, it was suggested that rather than hiring an Assistant Manager, the Board consider hiring a security manager to address recent security violations at the Club. Hunt responded that it probably didn't need to be an either/or situation, and the Board would consider both positions.

Other member comments included addressing food pricing in the dining room and the policy on losses from the Food and Beverage Department, ensuring that the general membership doesn't

Treasurer's Report

The Club's operating fund generated income of \$609,000 before the charge for the pension fund liability. Included in this amount is an operational departmental loss of \$4,200,000, membership dues of \$6,500,000, and fixed expenses of \$1,200,000.

The Building Fund has net income of \$2,400,000 which includes \$649,000 in initiation fees. The \$649,000 represents one hundred percent of initiation fees which is fully allocated to the Building Fund. Previously, a portion of initiation fees was kept by the Operating Fund to fund the minimum pension contribution. Building Fund dues were suspended January 1, 2015 and allocated to the Operating Fund with the purpose of funding the annual minimum pension contribution.

The combined net income was \$2,960,000 before the adjustment for the pension liability. At year end the combined member's equity was \$33,200,000. Once the unfunded pension liability figures have been determined, we will update this report.

The Club spent \$374,000 on capital improvements in 2017.

The major project was the furniture and fixture project in the Koa Lanai, Hau Terrace, and Ka Mo'i Boathouse. An additional \$647,000 was spent on repairs and maintenance in the Club. Athletic expenditures controlled by the committees were \$241,000 which is 4% of operating dues.

An Annual Audit of the Club's records is being conducted by KMH, LLP and a copy of the report will be available in the Controller's office for review by any member after April 1.

The Budget Committee carefully reviewed all the Club Department budgets, the Athletic Committee budget and the Capital Expenditure budgets to arrive at the final 2018 annual budget numbers. The Budget Committee approved an inflationary increase in dues of 2.12% which is necessary to fund rising costs and maintain facilities of the Club.

It is important that membership support the Club by utilizing our food and beverage outlets as the performance of the food and beverage operations are critical to the continued success of the Club.

have to cover the expenses through raised dues. Hunt replied that the Board policy called for F&B to break even each year and that with changes being made, they hope to do so in 2018.

Additional requests included replacing signage in the Fitness Room and locker rooms that clearly outline rules for use by members and guests, and if the upgrades being considered for the women's locker room can be opened up again to member feedback. Hunt said that numerous comments have been received about the men's and women's locker room designs and these will be taken into consideration before work is started.

Several members thanked the Board for the past year of improvements made to the property, including the furniture replacement project, as well as enhanced communication between the Board and members.

The meeting adjourned at 7:04 p.m. and members stayed to enjoy light refreshments.

Committee Highlights

- Admissions and Membership Committee welcomed a total of 143 new members in 2017, while 82 members resigned and 40 died in 2017, for a net gain of 13. Membership now totals 4,850.
- Building and Grounds proposed and accomplished a number of projects and improvements to our aging Club facility. They are working with management to address additional short and long-term strategies in 2018.



New Life Members: Mary Philpotts McGrath and Tay Perry

On the recommendation of the Historical Committee, nomination by the Board of Directors, and a unanimous vote by those present at the Annual Meeting on February 12, two long-time members were elected to the Outrigger's highest status... that of Life Membership.

This special honor is bestowed in recognition of exceptionally long and faithful service to the Club. The recipients for 2018 are Mary Philpotts McGrath and Tay Perry, both outstanding members who have contributed years of time and effort for the betterment of the Club. Coincidentally, they were high school classmates at Punahou.

Mary is the fourth generation of her family to belong to the Outrigger: the first one, J. R. Macfarlane Jr., was a charter member. Her grandmother, Kamokila Campbell, began the tradition of filling the large trophy with champagne for the winners of the Senior Six in the Macfarlane Regatta, a tradition that was continued by her mother, Muriel Flanders, and now Mary and her sisters, Alice Guild and Judith Flanders.

Mary is the niece of Walter Macfarlane for whom the Fourth of July Regatta is named. But not to rest on family laurels, Mary has made her own outstanding contributions to the Outrigger as well.

As a youngster, Mary called the Club her "second home" having spent a great deal of time there. When old enough, she paddled and played volleyball. After graduating from Punahou, Mary attended the University of Colorado and the University of Hawaii. She has had a long and illustrious career as an interior designer.

In 1984, Mary joined the Long Range Planning Committee and later served on the Finance and Building and Grounds Committees. She was elected to the Board of Directors in 1993, and in 2001 became the first woman president in the Club's history, an amazing accomplishment.

During her term of office, Mary's major objective was to keep member's dues from going up. Firmly believing that Outrigger is a family Club, she successfully worked to maintain the level of expenses necessary to cover all members of the family.

Since her tenure on the Board, Mary has continued to assist in any way she can, recently serving on the Ad Hoc Committee to select replacement tables and chairs for the Koa Lanai, Hau Terrace and Ka Mo'i Lounge. Mary is truly deserving of the honor of Life Membership.

Tay Perry's family arrived in Hawaii in 1870. His father was a member of the Outrigger for many years but resigned when the family moved to Lanikai. He was a founding member of the Lanikai Canoe Club and became a superb canoe builder and restorer, paddler and coach.

When his father was accused of nepotism when selecting crew members for the Lanikai Canoe Club, he encouraged his sons to join the Outrigger: they joined in 1955, became paddlers, and incidentally, repeatedly beat Lanikai.

From his father, Tay learned to build and restore koa canoes and to this day, it remains his passion.

In 1964, when the Club moved to its present site. Tay, newly married, living in Kailua, and having a small income, resigned from the Club and again paddled for Lanikai. In 1989, he rejoined the Outrigger and since then, has paddled, coached, built and restored koa canoes for the Club, and also served on several committees.

In 2000 Tay led a group of Club members to Kauai, where they found and returned one of the Club's most treasured koa canoes, *Ka Mo'i*, to the Outrigger. Tay and several others spent over eleven hundred hours restoring it after which it was hung from the ceiling of the Lounge, where it remains to this day. The popular gathering place was renamed Ka Moi Boathouse,

Tay has also designed and built from scratch many of our canoe racing trophies, as well and remodeling and refinishing others. He also built the miniature fishing canoe which is now in the Koa Lanai.

Tay not only works on canoes, but paddles and coaches as well. He has been closely associated with the Canoe Racing Committee and served as Chairman in 1996. Tay paddled on six state championship crews and has crossed the Molokai Channel innumerable times.

He has also coached crews in both regatta and distance races, the Master's Women winning first place in the Na Wahine O Ke Kai in 1990.

Tay has been a member of the Historical Committee for the past 24 years and is its present Chairman. He also served on the Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Board of Directors for six years and on the Beach and Water Safety Committee, Judges of Election, and Fitness Committee. Life membership is a most fitting award for Tay.

Both of our new Life Members are truly deserving of this honor. Congratulations, Mary and Tay! The Outrigger Canoe Club is grateful for your service.





President's Perspective

As many of you know, I spearheaded a more formal and consistent membership survey feedback loop to ensure the work being done by our outstanding committees and board reflects the wishes of our membership.

Based on the membership survey results administered this time last year, our committees are fast at work on a host of Club improvements. A few highlights include:

Locker Room Refurbishment

A number one concern among members, we are now in the final planning stages of a comprehensive refurbishment of both the men's and women's locker rooms (mock-ups and material samples can be found in the Lobby and on page 6).

Working closely with the Architectural Review Committee, the team, supported by an outside design team that has done numerous quality projects for the Club, has come up with a tasteful upgrade to the facilities.

In a perfect world, we would get this going in early spring and have it done before the paddling crush. More likely though this becomes an early fall project, but more to come here.

Snack Shop Upgrade


In keeping with our membership's desires, we will soon begin reviewing ways to upgrade the Snack Shop setting and its offerings; the most cherished and frequented part of the Club according to feedback scores. First and foremost, we will be looking at ways to resurface the surrounding area; from there, we will begin to contemplate ways to expand offerings (pre-made foods such as salads and sandwiches, fresh smoothies, etc.) along with how we can better accommodate high volume periods with the infrastructure we presently have in place.

Seawall Restoration

Our beach and ocean access is the Club's number one attraction according to our survey. Ongoing work on our ailing sea wall will be a key focus, as will be finding sustainable solutions for canoe and watercraft access to the ocean during high tides and surf.

There is a very capable ad hoc committee headed by Dolan Eversole that continues to drive these projects so we are in good hands.

In closing, if I do have one personal project I hope to accomplish, it is to see the roaming trio of Hawaiian musicians going from table to table, taking requests like the old days, bringing that special feeling of aloha to our premises... and maybe a steak fry in the sand too!

General Manager's Corner

Last month, we were able to close down the interior of the Clubhouse (Koa Lanai, Hau Terrace and Ka Mo'i Boathouse) for much needed repairs to the kitchen, as well as the installation of a new dish machine, replacing the old one after 30 years of service!

The entire kitchen was cleared of all equipment that could be moved. After that, the floor was grinded down, prepped and then a few coats of an epoxy material was applied and sealed with a water proof, anti-fungal sealant. Not only will this floor material provide a long lasting, safer non-skid surface for staff, but it will be easier to clean and maintain, providing a waterproof barrier to the floor below.

Through the years, we have been fighting with leaks into the lower level of the Club from cracks and crevices, causing countless maintenance headaches. This entire project was conducted in seven days and we were able to put the kitchen back together and open up for Super Bowl Sunday.

While we were at it, it was decided to remove the old worn and cracked circle driveway in front of the Club and replace it with new asphalt and paint, in conjunction with a walkway from the parking garage to the street. The parking garage was closed for four days to complete this project, and we were able to avoid rain and reopen the entrance on schedule!

We followed up with the project by installing new landscaping, irrigation and tiki torches along the new walkway. Now that we have this safe manner of entry, we encourage all members walking to the Club to please use the walkway, and avoid using the driveway entrance for access.

During this closure, we took advantage of the downtime to tackle several smaller projects, such as painting the main hallway

floor from the lobby to the Koa Lanai/Hau Terrace, repairing much of the spalling on the parking garage, and replacing some over used kitchen equipment, jet washing the parking garage and Hau Terrace, to name just a few of the projects.

Also during this time, many members of our OCC service staff enjoyed a private tour of the Honolulu Fish Auction, to better understand how seafood gets from Makai to our receiving dock!

Being able to close down a portion of the Club is important for the long term health of the Club facilities. Since we are open seven days a week, year round, it is difficult to take on major projects and still provide service to you, our members.

I have been communicating to the House Committee that we should make it a standard procedure to close down a portion of the Club for a week, to be able to complete these much needed repairs and replacements. This practice is standard in the private club industry, and our facilities will function better as a result. Feel free to ask any of us to show you the improvements of the kitchen. It was a long time coming and we would be proud to show it off.

I cannot be more proud of our OCC staff, particularly Robert Greer and our maintenance crew... Jim, Alex, Chris (Sparky!), and Kainoa, as they were invaluable in all the tasks they undertook to complete the projects we did complete, on time and on budget!

All other departments were well represented during the week, moving equipment in and out, cleaning, and organizing all the parts and pieces prior to reopening. Trust me, for many of us, it was not a week of rest!

I am lucky to be working with such a dedicated and hard-working team, and I look forward to seeing you around the Club.

Who Knew?

Outrigger Canoe Club fielded soccer teams from 1921-1924. The Surfers, as they were known, won the Honolulu Soccer League Association Championship in 1921, 1922 and 1924, and were second in 1923.

The Club compiled an enviable record of 26 wins, three losses and three ties in the four years its teams competed.

The teams played with two 20-minute halves, with a 10 minute break between. Each team consisted of 11 players, five forwards, three halfbacks, two fullbacks and a goalie. Substitution was not allowed until 1923.

Jack Rosemond served as captain of the Club's soccer teams, and a core group played the entire four years.

The Outrigger stopped playing soccer after the 1924 season as it could not recruit enough players to continue.







Board Briefs

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors on January 25, 2018.

Executive Committee: A member discipline issue was discussed. Finalized the agenda for the Annual Meeting. All of the celebratory presentations (Employee of the Year, Honorary member, etc) will be handled at the Mahalo/Aloha reception.

Membership Count: The Membership Count was 4,860 as of December 31, 2017.

OKLK Merger: Directors Chuckovich and Meheula presented the final, updated resolution to go forward with the merger with KLK, to form the Outrigger Ka Lahui Kai (OKLK). Resolution was approved.

Board approved revision to the Special Athletic Membership (SAM) regarding number of SAM participants: "In any calendar year, there shall be no more than 20 SAM participants and no more than 20 OKLK SAM participants."

President-Elect: Rob Durkin was elected to serve as President-Elect.

Traditions: Committee requested the Board approve the following traditions be preserved: Macfarlane Regatta always be scheduled on the 4th of July; Castle Swim always be held on the Sunday after Thanksgiving; Christmas Open House always to be held on Christmas Day. After some discussion, no action was taken.

Treasurer: Director Tokin complimented the job our Controller Jocelyn Apo has done to present the preliminary results of the year-end financials. Given that she has been on the job for two months, and being able to put the package together after only three weeks after the end of the year, is remarkable. Albeit a tough year in operations, management had a strong fourth quarter, particularly December, to end the year much better than forecasted earlier in the year. Our investments, pension plan, and building fund have all performed exceptionally in 2017, and overall, it was probably the Club's best year, financially. The Board thanked the treasurer for his leadership and stewardship. He will be missed.

Bylaw Ad Hoc: The Committee presented some bylaw revisions for further review.

Operations Report: Food and Beverage operations ended the year strong. Overall sales of a half million dollars, combined with good cost controls, ended in positive results. Christmas Eve and Day, including Member Open House were all successful. Total covers ended the year exceeding prior year. Logo Shop beat prior year, as James enjoyed a tremendous month in sales. All other operating departments performed well for the Club to show a positive finish, compared to prior year.

The General Manager presented an overview of the Club's Worker's Compensation history, over the last four years. Due to management focus on safety, and an active Safety Committee made up of employees, we are tracking in a positive direction. Should see some significant savings later in the year.

Project update: Garage repairs are complete. Leaving the stalls in that area on level "D" blocked off until after the closure, for adequate curing time. . . Pedestrian walkway is complete, and currently repiping the irrigation and gas lines (torches). We will complete the landscaping as soon as the driveway project is complete. . . There has been extensive organization and planning to implement these projects, and we look forward to reopening for Super Bowl Sunday on February 4.

Had a very successful Historical Stew and Rice program, with Bruce Black's presentation on the *Hokulea*. Attendance was 140, with positive comments from those in attendance. . . Hosted a luncheon honoring the Employees of the Month for 2017. At that lunch, we were pleased to

announce our Employee of the Year, from that group. Congratulations to Joni Lam in our Laundry Department, who continues to go out of her way to help wherever possible, with a smile. It is nice to award this to an individual in the "heart of the house", where staff works just as hard as those out in front. We will award her formally at the Mahalo/Aloha party.


