Eight Hawaiian swimmers are on the American Olympic team; in the men's team Hawaii placed seven men, the largest quota of any Association; and in the women's swims Hawaii's only entry, Mariechen Wehselau, was given second ranking place among the freestyle swimmers. The swimmers below are:

HAWAIIAN GIRL WON CENTURY

Mariechen took 100-meter Freestyle Race: Ederle Out

Mariechen Wehselau, Hawaii's only girl entry in the women's Olympic swimming trials in New York, won the 100 meters open race, the blue ribbon event of the meet, according to the first details of the trials which reached Honolulu yesterday.

Gertrude Ederle, Gotham flash, did not enter the century, having previously won the 400 meters; and Mariechen did not swim against her in the 150 meters, so the two contenders for world premier free style swimming honors will probably not meet in an open race unless Mariechen swims on her return from Paris.

Mariechen decisively defeated the pick of America's girl swimmers in the race, however, winning by a yard from Ethel Lackie, Chicago sensation who had been expected to give Miss Ederle her stiffest competition.
