Will Tour Australia With Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo: Trip To South Africa in Doubt

Word of Reservations Received Yesterday Through Theo. H. Davies & Co., Local Agents For Canadian-Australian Line; General Sports Comment

Word was received yesterday that the Australian Swimming Union has made reservations on the steamer Makura sailing south from here on Christmas eve for Mariechen Wehselau, Outrigger Canoe Club swimmer, and Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, chaperon. The message came through Theo. H. Davies & Co., local agents for the Canadian-Australian Steamship Co.

It was announced some time ago that Mariechen Wehselau had been invited to make the tour but the definite arrangements were not completed until the word came yesterday of the reservations. There is also a possibility that the Australian tour may be followed by a tour of South Africa, but that matter is still in the air.

Johnny Weissmuller, Illinois Athletic Club star, was also invited to make an Australian tour, but no word has been received as to whether he is going.
