

# Deans Nose Out Palama In Relay Meet Trials; Hammer Won by Lehman

## Wolfhound Captain Also Leads Discus Throwers With Good Heave; John Watt Defeated in High Hurdle Prelims

**O**TTO KLUM'S Varsity track squad nosed out Palama in the trials for the Rainbow Relay Carnival yesterday on Kam field by qualifying 22 men to the Pals' total of 20. The Outrigger Club was third with ten and the 27th Infantry, Guard, 13th Field Artillery and Y. M. C. A. followed with three, two, two and one respectively.

Captain R. G. Lehman, representing the 27th Infantry, took the first gold medal of the University meet by winning the hammer throw yesterday with a heave of 110 feet seven inches. Jim Cruickshank and "Pump" Searle of the Dean squad finished second and third and Frank Kanac of the Palama team took the fourth place. Lehman stands a good chance of copping

another first place in the discus as his throw of 116 feet four inches is leading the field of six qualifiers.

Others to make the grade in the discus were: K. T. Pong, Palama; Eddie Fernandez, Carl Farden and R. McLennan of the University, and Herman Clark of the National Guard. Clark has lost none of his old time form at tossing the 16-pound shot, for the big fellow went out yesterday and took the lead in his favorite event with 42 feet 8 1/2 inches.

### WATT DEFEATED

The surprise of the day came in the 120 yards hurdles when Johnny Morse and Akau, both of the Varsity squad, ran away from John Watt of O. C. C. Watt placed by finishing third and will have another chance to meet the two Deans tomorrow. Watt still has his old time form but did not step out between sticks as he used to. Robinson of the 27th took the first heat but the time was :19.2-5 which compared with :16.1-5 of the second heat indicates that the first three places tomorrow will come from Morse's heat.

The 100 yards novice trials were a disappointment. Bill Jones, star interscholastic century man was barred from the novice class and Ray Melin another speedy performer was scratched. Cabrinha of the Palama squad did not enter either so that the field that reported to the starter boasted of but few outstanding men. Ching of the Varsity stepped the distance in :10.2-5 and took his heat with Giles second. Freitas of the beach gang took his heat in :10.4-5, Johnston, Palama, won the third heat in :10.3-5 and Dolim of the same squad took the final heat in :10.2-5—the fastest of the day.

Morse, Melin and Whittle took it easy in their heat of the 220 yards hurdles and finished even in slow time. The second heat was a workout for Eddie Fernandez who won over Costa and Napiha of Palama in :26.5-10. Ching, of the Varsity is leading the broad jumpers with a leap of 21 feet four and a half inches. Ault of the Outrigger team is second with 20 feet six inches.

### GARTLEY AND CARTER QUALIFY

Dick Gartley showed some of his old ability to clear the high bar and qualified with five others for the finals tomorrow. Mel Carter, another Hawaiian representative at the western Olympic trials, qualified in the high jump. Charley Luis, former St. Louis star, was also among the six to qualify.

Willie Wise is leading the javelin throwers with 156 feet four inches. George Dawson is right behind the Dean grid star with 152 feet three inches.

With the results of the trials well split between the three favorites, tomorrow's meet promises to be close from first event to last. The Deans seem to have an edge but scholastic troubles are said to have entered the ranks and three Varsity men may not compete in the relays. The Outrigger Club will send speedy relay combinations to the track and Palama is also rated high on the cinders. The fans will turn out in full tomorrow for the first Rainbow Relay Carnival gives promise of being one of the best track meets ever staged in Hawaii.

Col. Adna G. Clarke has charge of the policing of the grounds tomorrow and has issued strict orders to all of his R. O. T. C. officers to allow no one on the field but actual competitors and officials. The public is asked to cooperate with the officials in keeping the field clear for the field events.
