Tosses 16-Pound Marble Almost 43 Feet At the Rainbow Relay Tryouts

Lehman of Schofield Wins Hammer Throw Finals; University of Hawaii Qualifies 22 Men While Palama Is Next With 20; Morse Beats Watt In 120 High Hurdler

One island record fell at the Rainbow Relay Carnival trials yesterday afternoon when Herman Clark of the National Guard Athletic Club heaved the 16-pound shot a distance of 42 feet 8 3/4 inches, breaking the Hawaiian mark made by M. De Mello of 41 feet 7 inches in 1923. Capt. R. G. Lehman of the 27th Infantry won the finals in the hammer throw with a heave of 110 feet 7 inches. He also led in the discus with a toss of 116 feet 4 inches. That's within a few inches of the island record made by E. K. Pong of 116 feet 6 3/4 inches in 1923. The island record for the hammer is 128 feet 5 inches, made by R. A. Ludlum in 1917.

The University of Hawaii got the jump on the other teams by qualifying 22 men in the trials yesterday. Then came Palama by qualifying 20 men, followed by the Outrigger club with 10, the 27th Infantry with two, the 13th Field Artillery with two, the Y. M. C. A. with one and the National Guard with one.

Surprise

The surprise of the day was the defeat of John Watt, former world record holder of the 440-yard hurdles. In the 120-yard high hurdles yesterday Johnny Morse and Akau of the university beat Watt to the tape. Watt qualified by placing third. The time was good and Watt, after making the last hurdle let down on his speed otherwise he would have finished right behind Morse, who had obtained an early lead. The time was good, :16 1-5, and indicates that when Morse and Watt clash in the final tomorrow there is a good chance that the island record will fall.

Dick Gartley didn't have to take his sweater off in order to qualify in the pole vault. Though he has had practically no practise the former Yale athlete showed excellent form.

Milton Carter, winner of the high jump last year, demonstrated that he has not gone back in the least and qualified easily.

Both Carter and Gartley are out to smash the island records. The present pole vault record for Hawaii is held by Gartley at 12 feet 10 7-8 inches. Carter holds the high jump at 5 feet 11 1-4 inches.

The broad jump record of 21 feet 11 3-4 inches made by C. Simons in 1917 is in danger for yesterday in the trials Ching of the University of Hawaii spread-eagled to within seven inches of that mark.

Willie Wise tossed the javelin 156 feet four inches which is within five feet 10 inches of his own island record.

The 100-yard novice brought out no stars and the times in all heats were slow considering the fact that the track was in excellent shape.

The policing of the grounds tomorrow will be in the hands of Col. Adna G. Clarke and he has requested that fans keep out of the field.
