

CHAMPIONSHIP IN WATER POLO TO HUI MAKANI

Outriggers Lose Big Game By Score of 4-1; Wright Is Star of the Evening

Warren Kealoha, world backstroke champion, and Hayward Wright, hitherto known as a boxer, football and baseball player, were the stars of the evening at the Palama swimming meet last night, which officially and formally opened the new tank.

Kealoha took the plain high diving and the 110 yards backstroke. Wright won the 50 yards novice and scored the most goals in the water polo game, which the Hui Makani won from the Outriggers by a score of 4-1.

The water polo game was close for the first half, Kealoha scoring one for the Hui Makani and A. R. Minville, Jr., one for the Outriggers. Wright scored two goals and Kaakua one for the Hui Makani in the second half, while the Outriggers were held scoreless.

The first race of the evening was the 25 yards for Palama boys under 14 years. It was a close event and to the winner went the honor of having his picture hung on the walls of Palama Settlement.

Katsuni Nakamura won the first race with John Chung second by a split hair. J. Botelho, 58th entry, was third, the time was :14 4-5.

As expected Warren Kealoha won the 110 yards backstroke open. Charles Pung finished second but Henry Luning would have given him a better battle had he not collided with Gay Harris in the last 10 yards.

Kealoha took the lead in the backstroke event after the first 10 yards. From then on the increased the lead winning by 2 yards from Pung in 2:48 1-5. Luning and Pung clung together with Luning slightly in the lead at times until the Luning collision with Gay Harris.

Hayward ("Sharkey") Wright, boxer, football player and baseball player suddenly jumped into the spotlight as a swimmer last night by winning the 50 yard novice.

H. Tapp of the Outriggers was second in the half century novice and Andrew Kinney, Hui Nalu, was third. The time was good, :26 1-5.

Lilly Bowmer May put up a good race against Mariechen Wehnalas in the 100 yards free style for women. Looks like Lilly is coming back. The time was excellent, 1:05 flat.

There was a day, not so many years ago when 1:05 flat for a woman's 100 would have been a world record and that's easily within the memory of the younger generation.

Lailahua Judd lost on her turns but she did manage to keep even with the leaders for the first 50. Lailahua is coming forward slowly but surely and since she's young she still has time to reach the championship class.

Warren Kealoha of the Hui Makani received the largest share of applause in the diving.

Hiram Kaakua of the Hui Makani got a great start in the century but Will Kirschbaum, his teammate, swam a stronger race and finished first. Bill Bergen known as "Maggie" was second. The time was 1:15 flat.

The plain high diving was won by Warren Kealoha with John Sable of Schofield second and K. McKinley of the Outriggers third.
