ably be admitted to the races free of charge, or will be given tickets for bleacher seats, this year, as a result of a request made by Lieut. Commander Wild last night. Since the participation of the navy in the regatta day races three years ago, there has been some complaint regarding the taking of fees from men in uniform, Commander Wild told officers of the club.

The Honelulu Rowing Club will make an effort to secure permission from navy officials to use pier 5-A, and to have coal barges placed from pier 5 to pier 7, from which vantage point sailors might view the races.

The rowing club this year will try to make some money and to put over a bigger and snappier program. George Cool said in addressing last night's meeting. He asked the assistance of other officers of the club in dispensing of several hundred tickets which are still unsold. He suggested that the various organizations in the city be requested to aid in sellin gthe tickets.

There will be one hundred parking spaces for automobiles on pier 2, Cool declared. Motorists will be charged \$7.50, but will be permitted to have as large a number of passengers in the cars as they wish. There will be 450 seats on pier 7.
