

# Miss Wehseleau Enters Against Miss Garratti Records Sure to Fall

Honolulu's Best Will Compete in Annual A. A. U.  
Gala Event This Month; Entries  
Are Still Open

MUCH interest is being shown in the A. A. U. Hawaiian Championship swimming meet which is to be held at the Panahou tank on the nights of October 29, 30, and 31. Although the entries have not closed yet, and many of the swimmers who are expected to enter have not as yet filed their entrance papers, still all indications are that the meet will draw more talent than has appeared for several years. The old-timers who have stayed modestly in the background in recent meets are now expected to come to the fore again in competition with the more recent stars.

Of course the two main attractions will be the visiting swimmers from the coast, who are going to compete with the local talent at this meet. Lester Smith has held several records in America, and is rated as one of the fastest swimmers on the Pacific coast. He will probably swim in the 440, 220 and 100 yard events, and it is expected that his entrance will lead to the establishing of some new records for the islands.

## MISS GARRATTI IS STAR

Miss Eleanor Garratti, who is to swim in the coming meet, is one of the foremost women swimmers in America. She holds the women's record for the 50 yards making the distance in 1:27.2. Miss Garratti is also a close contender for the record in the 100 and 220 yard events, making 1:01 in the century and 2:42 in the 220. She will meet her hardest competition in the coming meet in Marichen Wehseleau, Hawaiian champion in the 400 yards event and Olympic record holder. Miss Wehseleau swims the century in about 1:03 and when she is swimming against a fast field she should be able to cut this down considerably. Wehseleau and Garratti will meet in the 50, 100 and 220 yard swims, and should finish close in all three.

Several other well-known women swimmers are slated to compete in the meet. "Dot" Waters, who held the record for the 100 and 200 meters women's breast stroke for a while last year, will appear in this meet. "Dot" is a strong swimmer and is expected to make a good showing in the coming meet. Leliehua Judd, a good all-around swimmer, Pauline Laird, who made a name for herself in the Swaney Cup meet last year, John Moses, who holds the record for the plunge for women, making 67' 10", as well as being a speedy sprint swimmer, Janice Lovette, well-known Outrigger star, Miss H. Roberts who took the women's plunge last year, and several other prominent women swimmers are all expected to compete in the various events of the coming meet.

## WILL KEALOHA ENTER?

There will be some close competition among the men swimmers as well as the women, and judging from the big turn-outs at the Panahou tank where practice is being held, all events will have some fast entries. To date it is not definitely known whether or not Warren Kealohe will enter. If he does, it will increase the interest a great deal, and he should be able to speed up the events he competes in. Sam Kahanamoku will go in nearly all the sprints, as well as the breaststroke and the relays, and judging by his past performances, he will be well worth seeing again. In the breaststroke event Sam may have some keen competition if the Marine entry, Johnson, swims. Johnson is said to have made a name for himself in this event, his time being only two seconds over that of Sam.

In the 50 yards event Sam Kahanamoku, Henry Luning, C. Pung, and J. Wood are all slated to swim, and their respective times are close enough to assure fans of a good race. Smith, Wood, Luning, Dudley Pratt, Pung, Gay Harris, and perhaps Warren Kealohe will compete in the century. Luning and Pung will fight things out in the 50 and 100 yard backstroke events, and while Luning is given the edge, Pung always comes close enough to make the event doubtful.

## MATCH LIEUT. STICKLES

The open diving has drawn forth several old time performers, among whom are Thurston, former collegiate champ, and Bob Fuller, one-time springboard and high-diving champion of the islands. McKlancy of the Outriggers, Sabie of Schofield, and Kea of the Central Y are also slated to appear. In the plunge for distance Lieut. Stickles will probably place first, but there should be some close competition for the remaining places. Dudley Pratt and a dark horse from the Army will enter, as well as several others who have not yet filed their papers.

Both branches of the service are planning to enter full teams, and with the various local clubs doing likewise, there is little doubt but that the meet will be a success. The events are slated to be finished by 9:30 every night of the meet, with the water polo games taking place after that time for those who wish to stay. There will be eleven events each night, and medals are to be awarded for all places. Cups for the relays and water polo championships will also be presented.

These awards are to be on display the latter part of this week, at Dawkins-Benney.

The party of swimmers from the coast is expected to arrive here this week, and is to be met at the boat by a welcoming committee who will take charge of entertaining the visitors during their stay here.

lets hit their stride and then it was too late.

The first quarter opened sharply at 1:30 with the Artillery kicking off and before the whistle ending the first period had sounded the Artillery had rolled up 12 points. Plein kicked off to the Infantry 15 yard line and after both teams had several times attempted passes and then punted, the ball rested in the Gimlets' hands on their own 25 yard line, but after they had advanced the ball five yards on a line plunge they gave the Pilots their first opportunity to score when they fumbled and Plein heaved to King for 15 yards in their first completed pass in six attempts. Weiden plunged through for ten yards and on the next play, dove through off tackle for five more and the distance separating them from the goal. Plein failed to kick the goal. Score, 6 to 0.

A few minutes later and the Sky Pilots added six more. Plein again kicked off, Bean returning the ball to the Infantry 30 yard line. After they had been thrown for a loss on attempting to pass, Bartlett punted, but it was blocked and rolled behind the goal line where Clancy covered it for the Artillery's second touchdown. Again Plein failed in his attempt to kick the goal. The quarter ended shortly after the 21st Infantry had returned the kickoff with a punt. Score, 12 to 0.

No scores were made in the second quarter and a regular punting fiesta was put on. Bartlett's long punts featured this period. Fumbles were galore and in between punts both teams attempted passes, but seldom connected. The half ended as the Doughboys punted.

With the score 12-0 the second half opened with Coach Smith sending in his second string players and to make matters worse and add to the humiliation of the Gimlets they had been in there but a few moments when they scored. The Artillery had again kicked off. Bartlett punted and H. Miller caught it and raced over the goal line. Weiden kicked the goal. However, the Doughboys retaliated a few minutes later. Poratunsky's fine pass accounting for a touchdown. Smith had covered right end for 15 yards to the 40-yard line and after several attempted passes the Doughboys were held for downs but in turn they held the Pilots and recovered the ball on their own forty-yard line. Poratunsky passed to Seyler for thirty yards and Seyler crossed the goal line after covering 30 more yards over a clear field. Bartlett's attempt to kick the goal failed. Coach Smith then returned his regulars to the game.

In the last quarters the Gimlets had matters much their own way and once were on the verge of scoring but fumbles again ruined their chances. With the quarter half over Poratunsky had passed to Bean for 25 yards and with the ball on the 8th's 25-yard line they succeeded in getting a first down but on the next play with but 15 yards to go Poratunsky fumbled the ball and Wood recovered it for the Pilots. The game ended soon after the ball in the hands of the Pilots on the Gimlets' 40-yard line.
