This may be true. But where were they?

Lester Smith came over from San Francisco and cleaned up in every event. His marks were slower than Hawaiian swimmers have made in these events, and yet he won easily except in the sprint Saturday night when young Woodd gave him real competition.

Eleanor Garatti, sixteen year old girl, with very little tournament experience was beaten by our own champion and Olympic team member Mariechen Wehselau, but 11 two of the three races she made it mighty interesting for the champion.

It was no disgrace for Miss Garatti to be beaten by Miss Wehselau, and she takes her defeats philosophically. She argues that its all a part of the game, and is making plans to go right ahead and compete in future tournaments. The experience she gained here is invaluable.

We have other women swimmers besides Miss Wehselau and yet only the local champion entered the 220 yard event. Where were the others?
