

# Wehselau Finishes Third In 100 Yards Freestyle Event At Florida Meet

Ethel Lackie Wins Decisively In Fast Field; Eleanor Garratti Grabs Second Honors; Lackie's Time Slower Than Her Record; Bauer Breaks Her Own Record

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Feb. 12.—Miss Ethel Lackie of Chicago retained her 100-yard free style title here last night, winning decisively over a strong field. Eleanor Garratti of California was second, and Mariechen Wehselau of Honolulu finished third. Miss Lambert of New York finished fourth. The time made by Miss Lackie was 1:03 2-5, one and two-fifths seconds slower than her world's record established two weeks ago.

Miss Lackie and Miss Garratti swam on even terms for three of the four lengths of the pool, but Lackie gained a commanding lead in the last 25 yards, and finished with a strong sprint that carried her out to the front, ahead of the girl from the Pacific coast.

In the 400-yard relay for the national championship, the team from the Women's Swimming association of New York defeated the Detroit entry handily, winning the title in 4:32 1-5.

The 500-yard free style and the 100-yard breast stroke are the feature events on tomorrow's program.

Three world's records were broken during the third day's program. The Women's Swimming association relay team established a new mark for the 400-yard relay, and Sybil Bauer broke her own world's record when she negotiated the 300-meter back stroke against time in 4:53 2-5, her old mark being 4:59 3-5.

Geraghty and Norelius tried against time in special events and reset their laurels after they had been ruled out after last Tuesday's record-breaking events, owing to defects in the turning boards. Geraghty made the 200-yard back-stroke in 2:59, and Norelius made the 250-yard free style in 3:12.

Miss Wehselau entered three events in the Florida meet. She finished fourth in the 50 and 220 events and third in the 100 yard race. In the first heat of the 220 the Honolulu girl broke the world's record but the new mark stood less than an hour, Miss Norelius breaking it in the finals.

Mariechen signed up for only three events according to word received here from Mrs. E. Fullard Leo, who accompanied the swimmer as chaperon. She will take part in several other meets before returning to Honolulu, however.

## COMMERCIAL TILT AT COOKE FIELD

The second game Sunday will begin at about 3:30 o'clock.
