### Mrs. Swanzy Retires As Leader, After Serving Past Seventeen Years

Organization to Be Known as Uluniu Swimming Club; Mrs. Castle Is Newly Elected President; Board of Directors Changed

THE Women's auxiliary of the Outrigger canoe club passed out of existence yesterday afternoon. The organization will be known as the Uluniu Swimming Club of Honolulu, a typical Hawaiian name, meaning "Under the growing coconut palms."

With the passing of the Women's auxiliary came the resignation of Mrs. F. M. Swanzy, who, for the past 17 years has been the head of this splendid club and who has toiled unceasingly in its behalf. The success of the Women's auxiliary is due in a great measure to the organization efforts of Mrs. Swanzy. She is succeeded by Mrs. A. L. Castle, but Mrs. Swanzy will still be identified with the club, for the women yesterday insisted that she be made honorary president.

Mrs. Swanzy felt that because of the stress of other work, she should be relieved of her duties as head of the swimming club, and while the other women were reluctant to lose her, they finally consented after she had agreed to become their honorary president.

#### NEW DIRECTORS NAMED

Four new members of the board of directors were chosen and three of the old board re-elected. The new members are: Mrs. R. J. Farrar, Mrs. Charles Judd, Mrs. Arthur Greenwell, and Mrs. Arthur G. Smith. Re-elected directors are: Miss Nina Adams, Mrs. K. C. Leebrick, and Mrs. A. M. Nowell. Other officers re-elected are: House Committee—Mrs. W. A. Wall, chairman; Mrs. A. Fuller, Mrs. W. J. MacNeil, Chaperson, Mrs. W. A. Wall; publicity committee, Mrs. A. L. Castle. Committee on reception of women swimmers, Miss Nina Adams, chairman; Mrs. R. J. Farrar, Mrs. Charles Lucas, First vice-president, Mrs. Andrew Fuller; second vice-president, Miss Marie Ehrhorn; treasurer, Mrs. W. J. MacNeil; secretary, Mrs. W. A. Wall.

The meeting yesterday was the annual one of the club and a representative gathering of women attended. Mrs. Swanzy's resignation was not entirely unexpected. She had told her close friends that she felt the time had come to step down and that she would not be a candidate for re-election.

Reports of various officers showed the club to be in a healthy condition with a comfortable balance in the treasury. Annual dues have been increased slightly, and it was further announced that there are a few vacancies as the membership of 600 provided for by the constitution is not quite up to the full quota.

#### NEW RESPONSIBILITIES

The new Outrigger auxiliary has assumed not only a new name but additional responsibilities, and the outlook for the present year is exceedingly bright.

Reports that the Women's Auxiliary would consolidate with the Outrigger club are not correct. The women declared that their organization is on the friendliest of terms with the men's club and that their business relations have been extremely pleasant, but they declared that they wished to retain inviolate their own identity, as they have done in the past, and for that reason voted to change the name to the Uluniu Swimming club pointing out that the club has for its object the encouragement of a canoeing, surf riding, swimming and other water sports.
