

Record Breaking List Of Entries, For Japan-Hawaiian Aquatic Meet

More Than Ninety Will Compete in Punahou Tank Tomorrow and Saturday: Trial Heats Booked for Tonight

TRIAL HEATS for the Japanese-Hawaiian swimming meet under the auspices of the Outrigger Canoe club will be held in Waterhouse Memorial tank, Punahou, tonight in preparation for the meet tomorrow and Saturday nights.

The entry list, according to Victor Ligda, secretary of the Hawaiian A.A.U., is the largest for any meet staged in this territory.

There are 90 swimmers competing. They are from nine different clubs and representing various nations.

The clubs represented by the swimmers are: Central

Y. M. C. A., 19, Outrigger Canoe Club 23, Palama Settlement 13, Hui Makani 16, Nuuanu Y. M. C. A. 4, Hui Nalu 8, United States Army 6, Ulanis 2, and the Japanese Amateur Athletic Association 6.

GERMAN STARS MAYBE

The aim of this meet is far-reaching with six of the best swimmers from Japan, and possibly from the German Cruiser Hamburg.

In addition to this meet nine local mermaids will also appear on both nights of the meet in short and long distance events.

Changes in the program have been made. The 100 meter and 400 meter men freestyle which were booked for Saturday night were switched and these both events will be staged on the first night of the meet. The trial for these distances are to be held tonight at the Punahou tank.
