

100-METERS RACE TO BE RE-SWUM AT MEET TONIGHT

Woodd Pronounced In Perfect Physical Condition; Kahanamoku To Protest

The 100 meters free style event, which was declared "no race" at the Japan-Hawaii meet last night, will be re-swum tonight, according to announcement made shortly after noon today by the committee in charge.

The announcement was made after Johnny Woodd, sensation sprint star, had been examined by physicians and declared to be in perfect physical condition. Immediately following the examination Woodd announced that he would prefer to swim the 100 meters race tonight rather than next week.

K. Takaishi and T. Saitoh, members of the Japanese swimming team who are entered in the 100 meters, also preferred to swim the race over tonight.

Woodd was forced to drop out of the race last night because of a cramp. The report was circulated that he has a weak heart but this was discredited by the physicians' report. The medical examination this morning resulted in the report from the physicians stating that Woodd could not possibly be in better condition than he is at the present time.

The 100 meter race will be run off as an extra event on tonight's program. All other events will be held as scheduled, including the championship waterpolo game between the Hui Nalu and Outrigger Club teams.

Sam Kahanamoku announced this afternoon that he will not swim in the 100 meters tonight, but will file a protest with the A. A. U. claiming that the race last night should be allowed to stand and that he should be given first place. Officials say the 100-meters will be swum tonight regardless of Kahanamoku's decision.
