

JAPAN-HAWAII SWIM MEET CLEARED \$1000

SO SUCCESSFUL was the Japanese Hawaii swimming meet which closed Saturday night that more than \$1000 was realized, or will be realized after all expenses are paid, according to information from a reliable source, and it was further stated that the profits would likely be set aside for the purpose of sending a Hawaiian team to the Sesqui Centennial National outdoor championships in August.

Dad Center of the Outrigger club is in favor of this and will suggest, that it be done when the committee in charge of

the recent carnival meets this week.

Warren Kealoha should be one of Hawaii's representatives, as suggested in these columns yesterday The local A. A. U. has no funds available to pay his expenses and I doubt if his club can finance him.

Decision must be made quickly if Hawaii is to be represented at Philadelphia. In previous chats with Dad Center he has expressed himself as being very much in favor of sending one or two women swimmers in addition to the best men swimmers.

NOT WORLD RECORDS AS YET

WHILE the Japanese relay team's sensational time and Warren Kealoha's 100 meters backstroke mark are advertised as new world records, (and in one sense they are), yet the National A. A. U. will not recognize them as such, for world records in swimming can only be established at the Olympic games, and the next Olympiad comes off in 1928.

The Japanese relay record and Kealoha's 1:112-5 for the 100 meters will however be recognized as American swimming records and these marks are better than any other swimmers in the world

has ever done, so far as known.

The Associated Press carried a complete story of these record breaking performances, and every big newspaper on the mainland printed the story this morning.
