

JAPAN-HAWAII SWIMMING MEET IS BIG SUCCESS

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free style and here again the spectators were given an opportunity of seeing the star, Takahashi, in action.

Swimming with the same easy stroke that carried him to victory in the 400 meters Friday night Takahashi pulled into the lead at the start of the 200 meters and widened the gap between himself and Noda, Japanese swimmer who took second place, as the race progressed.

Benton Wood, Outrigger star, who was favored to give Takahashi a close run for first place, appeared to have an off-night and finished last, George Harris of the Hui Nalu beating him for third place.

Kept Same Pace

Takahashi did not come within five seconds of the world's record in the 200 meters but he was not closely pressed in that event. He kept up the same pace throughout the race except for his sprint the last 20 yards.

The 100 meters backstroke was the next open event for men and then came the 400 meter relay race. The Japanese and Outrigger teams were the only ones entered. Hui Makani and Hui Nalu having scratched. Sharp, E. Crabbe, C. Crabbe and Benton Wood were the members of the Outrigger team while Japan's team was composed of Noda, Saitoh, Arai and Takahashi. The swimmers swam in the order named, each swimming 100 meters.

Special Device

As the Pasadena tank is 25 yards in length a special device was installed to make it possible to hold the 400-meter relay. A heavy timber was placed on blocks 54.16 feet from the end of the tank. The first swimmer started from the end of the tank, swam eight laps and then swam the 54.16 feet to the timber. The timber was placed high enough to allow clearance for the swimmers to pass underneath it without bothering them in the least. The second swimmer took off the timber, swam the 54.16 feet to the end of the tank and then eight laps more. The third swimmer covered the same course as the first and the fourth the same as the second.

Saitoh Given Lead

Noda, swimming first for the Japanese, gave Saitoh a lead over E. Crabbe for the start of the second lap of the race. Crabbe held his own against Saitoh but Arai increased the lead over C. Crabbe and Takahashi was given a comfortable lead.

Despite the fact that he had already competed in two races that night Takahashi started out at a terrific pace and kept it up throughout the race. He sprinted the last 25 yards, churning up a trail of foam as he tore down to the finish for a new record. Takahashi swam a faster 200 meters in the relay than he did in the 200-meter race earlier in the evening.

Other Good Events

In addition to the events in which Japanese swimmers were entered there were many other stellar numbers on the program, including the 400 meters breaststroke for men, 100 meters freestyle for women, springboard diving for men, exhibition of Hawaii surfboarding, 300 yards medley for women and the championship water polo game between the Outrigger and Hui Nalu teams.

Bill Kirschbaum, Hui Makani swimmer, had things his own way in the 400 meters breaststroke. He took the lead at the start and increased it with each lap. He finished far in the lead in six minutes 25 2-5 seconds. Pang, Hui Nalu, was second and Bergin, Hui Makani, finished third.

Lovett Starred

Janice Lovett, Outrigger swimmer, who was the star in the events for women both nights, won first place in 100 meters freestyle for women. Her time was one minute, 15 2-5 seconds. Beatrice Newport, Outrigger club, took second and L. Judd, Uluia club, was third. Miss Lovett was not closely pressed.

Souza, Hui Makani, won the 100 yards breaststroke men's novice in one minute 18 seconds. Kometsani, Nuuanu Y. M. C. A., nosed out Chow of Palama for second place.

Makinney, Outrigger club diver, won first place in the springboard diving, with Hess of the Outrigger club second, and Fuller, Hui Makani, third. Makinney drew a big hand as he appeared in one dive after another, giving a fine exhibition in each. The judges had to draw a fine line choosing between Hess and Fuller for second place.

Waialua Swimmer

In addition to Johnny Woodd, several young swimmers from Waialua are showing much promise in competition, among them being Asano, who won the 100 yards free style event for boys under 15 years. Asano piled up a big lead the first 75 yards but weakened the last 25 yards. His lead was too big for his opponents to overcome, however, and he finished four yards in the lead. Robbins of the Central Y. M. C. A. was second and Nakamura, Palama, was third. Asano's time was one minute 10 2-5 seconds, three seconds slower than he made in the trials Thursday night.

The last event on the program before the water polo game was the 300 yards medley for women, which was won by Janice Lovett in four minutes 54 2-5 seconds. A. Douce of the Outrigger club was the only other swimmer entered in the event. Miss Lovett finished 20 yards ahead of her opponent, piling up a lead during the backstroke swim and increasing it the last 100 yards of free style competition.

Outrigger Won

The Outrigger polo team won the second leg on the Gay Harris challenge trophy by defeating the Hui Nalu aggregation, 2-1. The only score made by the Hui Nalu was Guerrero's goal in the last half of the game. Outrigger scored three goals in the first half and added two more in the last. H. Wood scored the first goal after two minutes of play, tossing the goal after receiving a short pass. E. Crabbe made the second goal and C. Crabbe followed with another.

E. Crabbe and Makinney scored the goals for Outrigger during the last half. The Outriggers tightened up their defense whenever the Hui Nalu took the ball within the danger zone and Gay Harris saved many goals.

How can a batsman hit a ball over the fence and yet receive credit for only a single?

Break taserunning is very necessary to make such a thing possible, yet it has happened several times in both major leagues.

A few years ago Toporcer of the St. Louis Cardinals was the victim of such a tough break at the Philadelphia park.

With a runner on first he hit a drive to right field that eventually cleared the fence.

The runner on first was of the opinion that the ball wouldn't carry over the fence, that there was a chance the fielder might catch it.

Working on that supposition, he played it safe by going only half way to second and watching the course of the ball.

The batsman, confident the ball would clear the fence, gave no thought to the other runner. He passed him on the baseline between first and second.

This automatically retired the man who had hit the ball over the fence and in the box score he received credit for only a single.
