HAWAII'S swimming team for the trip to Japan was announced last night after time trials in Punahou tank ordered by the swim committee of the Hawaiian A. A. U. and instead of nine swimmers and Coach George (Dad) Center, the number has been increased to ten, the four added last night include the two Crabbe brothers, Outrigger Canoe club; George Harris, Hui Nalu and Ah Kong Pang of the same club.

The trials last night provided competition in only one event, the 440 yard breaststroke. Pang and Hiram Kaakua being the contestants. Pang won by more than a length of the tank in 7:04.

For the 220, 400 and 1,000 meters free style, but three contestants appeared when Chairman C. Dudley Pratt announced the events and called for starters. The Crabbe brothers and George Harris.

Coach Center announced that his relay team would be Clarence Crabbe, Warren Kealoha, Johnny Woodd and Benton Wood.

It was reported yesterday that Warren Kealoha would not make the trip to Japan but Judge Rawlins stated that Warren would accompany the team.
