

# 3 NEW MARKS ARE ESTABLISHED AT JAPAN RACES

## Japanese Swimmers Defeat Stars From Hawaii In Two-Day Swimming Meet

TOKIO, Sept. 8.—Japan defeated Hawaii in the two-day swimming meet completed here this afternoon. The total points at the end of the inter-nation meet were Japan 26, Hawaii 16. Yesterday's meet resulted in Japan taking 14 points, and the visitors 7. Today the local team piled up 12 points to Hawaii's 9.

Three world's records fell in the meet. Yesterday Warren Kealoha flashed over the line in the 400 meter backstroke in six minutes and one second. This was in an exhibition event. Today the Japanese lads established a new mark in the 800 meter relay. The time was 9 minutes, 38 1-5 seconds. Takaishi swam the 200 meters freestyle event in 2 minutes, 16 4-5 seconds. This is believed to be a new world mark for the swim in a 50 meter pool.

### Takaishi Again

Takaishi flashed across the line in the 200 meters freestyle event in what is claimed to be a new world's record in a 50 meter pool. His time for this event was 2 minutes, 16 4-5 seconds. Johnny Woodd and Sam Kahana m o k u, both wearers of the Hawaii colors, finished second and third respectively.

Warren Kealoha, Hawaii's premier swimmer, who broke the world's record in a 400 meter backstroke exhibition event yesterday, took first honors in the 100 meters backstroke swim today. His time was one minute and 14 seconds. Kimura, local youth, touched the end of the tank second, and Gay Harris, of the visiting team, was third.

### C. Crabbe Second

In the 1500 meters freestyle event Arai churned the water to finish first in the excellent time of 22 minutes and 4 seconds. Clarence Crabbe, Hawaii, was close at his heels, and Yoneyama finished third. Benton Wood, Hawaii, was fourth.

A new world's record was set up in the 800 meter relay by the Japanese mermen.

The local lads finished in 9 minutes, 38 1-5 seconds. Noda, Sada, Arai and Takaishi made up the winning four, and the Hawaii team was composed of E. Crabbe, Sam Kahanamoku, Gay Harris and Johnny Woodd.

### Did Their Best

At the close of the meet the Hawaiians made no alibis. They declared they did the best they could and hoped to do better in the Osaka meet, which is to be held on September 11 and 12.

The Japanese swimmers, who performed in Hawaii tanks last spring, said they believed the water was somewhat cold for the Hawaiians.
