

NAVY FAVORED TO GRAB HONORS IN THE SENIOR RACE

Healani and Myrtle Crews Listed As Dark Horses In Main Events

All crews are now in Honolulu and reports from various camps are that they are all in fine shape for the 1926 Regatta Day races to be held in Honolulu harbor tomorrow.

The Navy senior and junior crews will go into the races favorites, despite the fact that Hilo won the senior race held in Hilo harbor on July 4. Those who pick the Navy crews to win base their opinions on the conditions of the oarsmen, but both the Healani and Myrtle senior crews are being backed by many to upset the dope which places them in second running.

The Healani and Myrtle senior and junior crews have been re-organized since July 4 and the Myrtle senior outfit has been clocked in the fastest time over the Honolulu course during practice.

Crews Arrive

The Hilo crews arrived in Honolulu this morning, 28 oarsmen being in the party. Immediately following their arrival they visited the Police boathouse, which was turned over to them for their use by Sheriff David L. Trask. The Hilo crews took a spin over the course this morning and will have their final trip over the course this evening.

The Hilo coach, Heine Kellner, reports that the oarsmen had a fine trip from the Big Island and are all in fine shape for the races tomorrow. Kellner and all of the Hilo oarsmen were disappointed with the first drawing of lanes and have protested as they did not have an official representative at the meeting when the drawings were made. The results of the drawings follow (No. 1 lane is on the side toward the wharves): No. 1, Kauai; No. 2, Myrtle; No. 3, Navy; No. 4, Healani; No. 5, Police, and No. 6, Hilo.

Entries have been received for all of the races and everything is in readiness for the start of the races with the possible exception of re-drawing for lanes.

Give Signals

Arrangements have been made for the siren to signal winners of the various races. The signals agreed upon follow:

One blast, Kauai; two, Myrtle; three, Navy; four, Healani; five, Police; six, Hilo. The same schedule will be maintained regardless of the lanes occupied in the respective races, for there will be shifts in lanes in the events in which Kauai is not entered. But the same tune will be followed throughout the morning and if three blasts sound off, it will be Navy, and so on down the line.

Tickets are still on sale and can be obtained at the Honolulu Paper Co.

The first race will start promptly at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and will be a race between 18-foot Mower design sloops. The complete tentative program announced today follows:

Course: From a line opposite Pier 9 out to flag opposite Pier 1 and return to starting point. Distance, one mile.
