

Fast Field Is Entered In Championship Race; More Entries Expected

Frank Cerny, Ed Nather, Henry Harrison and Henry Medeiros Among Favorites to Run; "Dark Horses" Also on List

THE first Territorial Fair six-mile championship road race will be held Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, according to announcement made yesterday by Col. R. M. Schofield, chairman of the fair. Final arrangements for the race have been made and the starters will line up at the corner of Fort and King Streets at 3:15 p. m. for final instructions and the gun that will send them into action.

Entries for 12 runners already have been received, but it is expected that several more will be received at the post, it having been decided to allow post entries to compete, provided they are registered amateurs. Those runners desiring to compete in the road race should obtain their amateur cards from the A. A. U. office before Thursday.

STARS ENTERED

Among the starters are Frank Cerny and Ed. Nather of Schofield. Army running champions. Both runners have trained faithfully for the race and are in the pink of condition.

Other entries are Henry Harrison and Arthur Johnston of Palama, Henry Medeiros of Outrigger, Raymond Inahuku, Miyake, D. M. Martin, Sorenson and Marine, the latter three representing the service.

The course of the race will be along King street from the starting line at Fort street, to Kalakaua, out Kalakaua to Kapahulu road and thence into the fair grounds to the track, through the main entrance. The race will be completed on the track and will finish in front of the grandstand at approximately 4:15 p. m.

The winner will receive the J. P. Morgan perpetual trophy and a gold medal offered by the fair. Silver and bronze medals will go to the second and third places and bronze medals will be presented to all runners finishing within a time limit of 40 minutes.
