

# Janice Lovett Stars In Uluniu Meet; Lily Bowmer May Ties American Record

Outrigger Canoe Club Girl Defeats Mainland Stars In 440 Yard Freestyle Event; Visitors Make Fine Showing In Relay; Many Sensational Races On the Program

Janice Lovett, Outrigger Canoe club star, is the latest sensation in Hawaii's swimming circles as a result of her performance last night at the opening of the Uluniu swimming meet. Largely through the efforts of Miss Lovett, who placed first in the 440 yards free style for women and swam anchor on the winning relay team, the Outrigger club is leading in the club competition with 20 points.

The Club Casa Del Mar swimmers of Santa Monica, Cal., Lily Bowmer May and Cecily Cunha, each swam two laps in the club relay, the final event of the evening, and placed second. Janice Lovett coming from behind to nose out Mrs. May on the final lap. However, it has not been definitely decided whether or not the second place points will go to the mainland club as rules call for a team of four swimmers. Without these points the Club Casa Del Mar will have nine points to its credit as a result of last night's competition. The Uluniu club is close behind the Outrigger with 18 points, provided second place points in the relay go to that club.

It was erroneously announced this morning that Miss Lovett won the Swanzy cup by winning the 440 yard freestyle event last night. Competition for the Swanzy cup does not open until tonight and Miss Lovett is not competing for it, officials of the Uluniu club announced today.

## Tied Record

One American record was equaled last night when Lily Bowmer May, former Honolulu girl and now a member of Club Casa Del Mar, Santa Monica, swam the 50 yards freestyle for women in 27 3-5 seconds, defeating the local girls by a wide margin. This establishes a new Hawaiian record for that distance, the old mark of 28 seconds having been made by Mrs. May in 1923.

The 50-yard American record is held by Eleanor Garratt. Since she established the record in 1925 Miss Garratt has swam the distance in 27 seconds flat. Mrs. May has also been credited with making the swim in 27 seconds, but neither of these marks has been allowed.

Mrs. May got off to a perfect start and turned first at the 25 yard line. On the home stretch she pulled away from the local girls and finished some distance in the lead.

## Exhibition Swim

In an exhibition event Warren Kealoha, Hawaii's champion backstroke swimmer, failed in an effort to lower the American record of 5 minutes 54 4-5 seconds for the 400 meters backstroke. Kealoha covered the distance last night in 6 minutes 1 2-5 seconds.

Another feature event on the program was the 440 yards freestyle for women in which Miss Lovett made such a fine showing. Miss Lovett started off at a fast pace, gradually piling up a lead. At the end of the 10th lap she was eight yards ahead. At the 12th lap she was 11 yards in the lead and she increased this one yard in the next 50 yards. Miss Cunha of the Club Casa Del Mar cut down the other girl's lead about two yards in the last 60 yards and finished about 10 yards behind, her time being 6 minutes 14 seconds, the best time she ever made for the 440 yard event. Miss Lovett finished in 6 minutes 4 4-5 seconds.

In commenting on the 440-yard event Miss Cunha praised Janice Lovett for the fine showing made by the local star.

"Janice swam a wonderful race and deserved to win," Miss Cunha said. "She is a real star and I hope she gets a chance to compete against fast swimmers because I believe she can come very close to the world's record in the 440 yard swim."

The other thriller on the program was the 200 yard women's club relay, won by the Outrigger club quartet.

The two mainland girls deserve much credit for their showing in this event. They offered to swim two laps apiece in the relay, knowing that they could not win the trophy offered because they did not have a regulation team. The visitors entered the event merely to furnish competition for the other two teams.

On the first lap Miss Cunha gave her teammate a small lead and Mrs. May increased this on the second lap. However, the strain on the two mainland girls began to show on the third lap and Mrs. May entered the water on the final lap only about a yard ahead of Janice Lovett. Miss Lovett came from behind on the home stretch and out-touched the visiting star.

At the meet tonight A. S. Bent, president of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, will present a trophy to the girl swimmer making the most points in competition the two nights of the meet. The trophy was donated by the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce.
