WAIKIKI BEACH, known as the home of world's champion swimmers, has another class champion in Miss Lottie Belle McDonald, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. McDonald, swimming instructors at the Outrigger Canoe club. Miss Lottie Belle is two years and eight months old and is registered in mainland records as the youngest swimmer in the world to use a definite and legitimate stroke.

Lottie Belle learned to dog paddle in the home bathtub when she was a little tot of nine months. Her father and mother started her in young and before she was a year old she was swinging into accepted strokes with alacrity.

She soon entered deep water and was able to keep afloat with a tread of five minutes—in water that went to a depth of 40 feet. At one year she was beginning to dog paddle and she started to make progress with the side and breaststroke. At two years she became adept at the side-stroke and won national recognition as the youngest swimmer in the world to use a recognized stroke, the next to her being a youngster of Los Angeles by the name of Hettwick, who was three years and nine months old before he swung into an accepted stroke.

At two years and five months she was using a beautiful breaststroke and now, three months later, she is doing nicely at breast, back and side strokes. Her form in the water is smooth, and already shows the effect of the careful coaching of her parents, who are spending time in the development of the strokes along recognized form lines.

Lottie Belle can dive from a three-foot platform and can take to the water in the same form that she goes through her swimming movements.

Most of her acquirements are the result of imitation of her parents and of careful observation on the part of the little tot. She has shown a natural bent towards swimming, and there are many along the beach who know her who predict that someday she will make her mark high in the women's swimming world.

She was born in Hilo two years and eight months ago, so if the
