Several women competed in the 25 yard dash for women between 30 and 40. They were not afraid to make their ages known. This event was won by Mrs. R. J. Farrar, a strong swimmer. Mrs. Flint was second.

The club relays brought out plenty of excitement. In the athletic club events Y. M. C. A. was first, Beach Combers second and Outrigger third. The civic clubs, Rotary, Lions and Ad clubs also furnished plenty of excitement Rotary winning, in :58 flat.

Plenty of splashing in the 75 yard medley for men. Dr. Paul Withington won by several yards, Dad Center was second, Genoves third and Herman Von Holt fourth. The time was :59 flat. Victor Lidga and Art Powlison were the other contestants. The men swam breast stroke first, then back stroke and finally free style. Three cheers were offered up for Dad Center the popular coach, as he gave Dr. Withington a real race.

An added feature was the race between Lieut. Commander MacComb representing the Sub Marines and Sergt. Palardeau the Transport service.

MacComb swam 25 yards under water the length of the tank and won the race. His opponent used the back stroke. The time for this event was :21 2-5.

Loud and rousing cheers when the Faculty race was announced. Faculty from McKinley led by Miles Carey, Punahou by Frank Hauck and Normal School with Bill Mienecke as captain took to the water at the starter's gun. Punahou won and students in the crowd gave their school yell. McKinley was second.

As a special race the oldest woman and the youngest boy swam 25 yards. Seven year old "Buddy" Hough and Mrs. Melva Williamson. The boy won rather easily and was timed in :31 flat.

An event that required plenty of wind was the balloon race for women. The idea is to blow a toy balloon across the tank while swimming. If the balloon is touched with head or lips the contestant is disqualified. Mrs. Pung and Mrs. Farrar blew a dead heat.

The kahuna stone fetching contest was won by Commander MacComb who was first to reach the big stone and who came up with it in his arms.

One of the features of the evening was the father and sons' re-

lay, the sons swimming first. It was announced that a new world's record would probably be established. The event was hotly contested. John D. Kaupiko and John D. Jr., won in :12. Dr. Paul Withington and his young son finished second, while Ned Crabbe and his son were third, finishing in a dead heat with George Paul and his boy.

The plunge for distance brought forth plenty of competition and was won by H. Smith, 63 feet 7 inches. George P. Cooke, who won his Y at Yale some years ago, was second with the fine mark of 62 feet 7 inches. Dr. W. C. Neidermeyer was third, 58 feet 7 inches, and Commander MacComb fourth, 54 feet.

Another feature event, an added feature, was the appearance of Charles En Sue Pung, Mrs. Pung and the 10 little Pungs ranging from 8 to 18 years. The tank was filled with Pungs, and it was announced that the Pung family had won. Daddy Pung should be able to develop a champion from among the bunch.

Mrs. Farrar won the 100 yards for women. Mrs. Paul was second and Mrs. Smith third, while the men's 100 yards open was won by Dr. Withington, Turner second and Genoves third. Time—1:06.

One event, the 100 yards college men's relay, has been postponed until tonight.
