

CRABBE OBEYED ORDERS, THAT'S WHY HE WON

NE of the outstanding surprises of the Mid-Winter swim meet under the auspices of the Outrigger club was not the defeat of Lester Smith, Olympic club star, by Clarence Crabbe, but the defeat of Sharp by Crabbe. Sharp disregarded these instructions and set the pace. Crabbe kept on even terms with Lester Smith, with the result that on the home stretch he had some reserve strength left. Sharp's 'cork" was pulled. He could not maintain the lead he had set.
