Outrigger Canoe Club Team Annexes Title In Junior National Event

Crabbe Establishes Himself as Best All-around Swimmer in Hawaii Championship Meet

Establishing a new Hawaiian record of 5 minutes 51.5 seconds in the 440 yard freestyle event Clarence ("Buster") Crabbe, Outrigger Canoe club merman, showed Saturday night that he will be a strong contender for middle distance honors at the men's national outdoor swimming championships to be held here August 24-25-26 and 27.

Despite the fact that he was not hard pressed Crabbe, swimming in the Hawaiian championship meet at Puna-hou tank, covered the 440 yards in time that comes close to world's records.

Not only did he set this mark as well as one in the 300 yard medley swimming, but "Buster" also established himself as the best all-around swimmer in the meet by winning the 220 yard backstroke event. He hit the finish in 2 minutes 50 3-5 seconds, which is very fast time when it is remembered that Crabbe is regularly a freestyle performer.

The other outstanding event of the meet Saturday was the Outrigger Canoe club's victory in water polo which gave them the junior national championship for this year. The Outriggers' defeated the Central Y. M. C. A. aggregation by a 5-0 score.

The performance of Mariechen Wehseleau, Hawaii's leading woman swimmer, in the 880 yard swim, was another feature of the meet. Miss Wehseleau, who formerly starred in the sprint events, had no serious competition in the half mile swim. Despite this fact she romped home in time that was close to the world's record—just two 2/5 seconds behind Ethel McGary's mark.

Miss Wehseleau swam a great race and showed that she must be considered in the running for national honors in the half mile swim. Miss Abreu of the Uluniu club, took second place in the event, but was several lengths of the tank behind the winner. Leilehua Judd was third. These same positions were held by the three girls when they swam the half mile at The Star-Bulletin's annual swim in the Ala-wai on June 30.

Johnny Woodd, Central Y. M. C. A. swimmer, showed that he is still out in front among local sprint swimmers when he won the 100 meters freestyle in 60 2/5 seconds, considered very fast for this event. Sam Kahanamoku of the University of Hawaii finished second, and Ed ("Bud") Crabbe of the Outrigger club, was third.

In establishing the new record in the 440 yard swim "Buster" Crabbe finished more than 50 yards ahead of Newport, another Outrigger swimmer. Crabbe started pulling ahead at about the half way mark and increased his lead from 20 to 50 yards

during the last six laps. Ed Crabbe took third place.

Wilfred Lee, clever Army diver, who won the junior national fancy high diving championship Friday night, showed his class again Saturday and won the Hawaiian championship in springboard diving. Sonenburg of the Marines took second place and Harry of McKinley was third.

"Buster" Crabbe furnished the surprise in the 220 yard backstroke event when he finished ahead of John Komenaka, McKinley star. Gay Harris of the Outrigger club was third.

Harry Glancy, first of the mainland swimmers to come here to prepare for the national championships, was at the meet Saturday and gave another exhibition, this time swimming 50 yards breaststroke, 50 yards backstroke and 50 yards freestyle.
