AMERICAN STARS ANNEX LAURELS IN OPENING MEET

Swimmers Honored By Officials In Japan; Laufer, C. Crabbe, Set Records

YOKOHAMA, Japan, Oct. 3.—The
invading United States swimmers
walked off with the prime honors
in the International Aquatic meet
just held in Japan. The winning
contingent "copped" eight of the 10
events, with Clarence "Buster"
Crabbe, Outrigger Canoe club swimmer and protege of George "Dad"
Center, who recently won the
American championship for the
mile swim in Hawaii, splashing to

a new record.

Crabbe set a new Japan record by doing the 800 meters freestyle in 10 minutes 39 1-5 seconds, while Walter Laufer, the 19-year-old marvel of the Cincinnati Y. M. C. A., by doing the 200 meters backstroke in

a Japan record. The record for the 200 meters backstroke was hitherto held in Japan by Irie, his time being

2 minutes 57 1-5 seconds.
The American contingent proved to be far too powerful for either the

2 minutes 40 1-5 seconds, also upset

Japanese or the Australians. The Australians did not come up to expectations, the total points for the 10 events put up by the lads from the Land of the Southern Cross being only eight. Japan had 24 points against 41 points scored by the victorious American team. One reason for the bad showing of the Australian team was the unsuually cold weather that struck Japan just about the time the meet was being held. Very low temperatures, with cold showers, have been the order of the day ever since the meet started. Met by Officials

If duty did not demand that he be in barracks, there is no doubt that the "sports prince of Japan" would have graced the Osaka meet with his presence.

The meet, which took place at the Chikko pool in Osaka, was opened by his imperial highness, Prince Kaya, who, previously, received in audience all the contestants and the officials of the meet at the residence of Baron Fujita, where they were formally welcomed to Japan.
