

# Olympic Trials Will Be At Same Time; Proceeds Going to Olympic Fund

## Sanction Given for Big Meet; McKinley High School's Lincoln Meet Is Indefinitely Postponed

The Hawaiian association of the A. A. U. will stage a two-night swimming meet at the Waikiki Memorial pool for the Hawaiian swimming championships and the Olympic tryouts on Friday and Saturday nights, April 20 and 21.

This was decided yesterday by the association's registration committee after the promoters of the Lincoln swimming meet decided to postpone their affair indefinitely.

It was felt by the members of the committee that all clubs should concentrate on this one meet.

It was pointed from the financial angle that if the public can be assured of one big meet where the leading swimmers of the local circle will perform, the affair will be well attended and the proceeds, which will go to defray the expenses of the Olympic team, will be much higher.

Committees and definite plans for the meet will soon be announced by A. A. U. officials.

At the session yesterday, the Punahou schools sought the sanction of the association for several dual swimfests, against the all-service team, the University of Hawaii and the Outrigger Canoe club. After a lengthy discussion, the sanction was granted.

### Vote of Thanks

At the regular meeting of the association held at the Central "Y" building last night, the resignation of F. Elmer Crumly, secretary of the association, was reluctantly accepted.

Crumly plans to depart from the islands Thursday. The representatives present at the meeting gave him a vote of thanks for the valuable service rendered the A. A. U. especially in the national championships held here at the opening of the Memorial tank.

No successor was elected and the matter was left in the hands of George ("Dad") Center, president, who was not able to attend the meeting.

Net profits made in the basketball series up to March 12 will be split pro rata among the clubs not concerned in the second play-off series. A resolution to this effect was adopted by the board.

A resolution to permit the three teams, Honolulu Athletic club, Palamas and the All-Around Chinese athletes, to split the net profits three ways in the second play-off series for the championship, was adopted.

Ernest Chase of the track committee recommended more attractive but smaller track medals for the coming A. A. U. meet and he also submitted a list of officials for the meet.

Mrs. Fullard-Leo of the Uluniu Women's club stated the willingness of its members to cooperate in raising funds to send a representative Olympic team from Hawaii for the try-outs in Detroit.
