

# D IN FIRST MEET MISS WEHSELAU, LILY BOWMER MAY SWIM EXHIBITIONS

Memorial Pool Scene of First of Local Aquatic Carnivals to Raise Money for Hawaiian Team's Entry Into Olympic Trials in Detroit

**C**LARENCE "BUSTER" CRABBE, Hawaii's champion 400 meters swimmer, gave a remarkable exhibition in the Wai-kiki Memorial pool last night when he made the distance without the aid of lanes in close to record-breaking time.

This event was the feature of the first of a series of aquatic carnivals for the purpose of raising money to send Hawaii's best swimmers to the Olympic tryouts to be held in Detroit next June, and it was sponsored by Aaron De Roy, prominent Detroit sportsman, who is at present in Honolulu.

In addition to Crabbe's performance Lily Bowmer May swam an exhibition 100 meters. Mariechen Weh-selau also swam an exhibition in the 200 meters open, but their times were not impressive.

#### NEWPORT IS FAST

Other notable performances last night included the 200 meters for boys under 18 which was won by W. Newport of the Outrigger club.

Newport, another "Dad" Center prodigy, has shown enough class in this event to be figured as a promising contender for a position on the Hawaii team. With but little competition Newport finished in the fast time of 2 minutes 29 2-5 seconds.

#### ALL OVER THE POOL

In the 400 meters freestyle, "Buster" Crabbe swam against his brother "Buddy" and Gonsalves of Hui Makani. Crabbe took the lead from the start and was all over the pool. Had there been lanes for the A. A. U. champion he would undoubtedly have equalled or broken the Olympic record for this distance which is 4 minutes 56 seconds, and held by Johnny Weismuller of the Illinois Athletic club. Crabbe's time for the distance was 4 minutes 58 seconds flat.

In the 100 meters open Johnny Woodd of the Central YMCA. nosed out "Buddy" Crabbe O.C.C. sprint man, in another high light of the meet. The Outrigger first team, composed of H. Sharp, W. Newport, C. Crabbe and E. Crabbe won the relay. Nuuanu Y placed second and the Outrigger second team came third.
