## "Buster" Crabbe Close To Record: Fair Times Made In Impromptu Meet

Mariechen Wehselau and Lily Bowmer May Make Good Showings in Two Exhibition Events

Clarence ("Buster") Crabbe, national one-mile swim-ming champion and king pin of the Outrigger Canoe club mermen, was the star performer last night at the new War Memorial natatorium when the "On to Detroit" swimming meet was staged.

The Outrigger club team won the meet, scoring 53 points to 25 for the Central "Y" team. Other teams made the following scores: Nuuanu "Y" 10, Palama 10, Army 5, McKinley 4, Lincoln 1 and Hui Makani 1. Exhibition events, surfboard contest and the service race were not counted in the score.

Crabbe's stellar performance was in the 400 meter freestyle event. The Outrigger star won the race by a big margin over his brother, "Bud," who took second place, and Gonsalves, who finished third.

Crabbe showed considerable im-provement over his performance in the national outdoor championships at the natatorium last August. He finished the 400 meters last night in 4 minutes 58 seconds, which is 6 2-5 seconds faster than the Olympic record, and only two seconympic record, and only two seconds slower than the world's record.

The Outrigger star took the lead from the start and was never hard pressed. Lanes were not laid out in the 100-meter tank and as a rein the 100-meter tank and as a re-sult Crabbe wandered off his course. It was figured by officials that he would have saved five seconds had the course been laid out with lanes roped off.
