McGUIRE IN HURDLES

Walter McGuire, Punahou and Outrigger crack sprinter, is figured to better J. Watt's record in the 220 yards low hurdles created in 1918. McGuire clipped the distance faster by 3-5 seconds last week, incidentally breaking Ray Melim's mark in the Rainbow Carnival. The Pun flash will not lack competition as Indie of Palama, Ching and Lee of the Varsity and Melim will be entered in this event.

It is the opinion of the writer that George Kahoiwai, Kam school captain, can topple either the 440 yards or half mile accomplishments which have not been nicked for a decade. But the Hawaiian Mercury must give his all in only one event if he hopes to set a new mark. It would be a disappointment if the Palama luminary has to reserve his energy for several races as he had to do in the Interscholastic meet.

In this competition, Kahoiwai broke the tape in the half mile run in 2 min. 4 3-5 seconds and still holding himself in check to beat the field in the 440 yards dash in 51 3-5 seconds right after that. What if the Kam phenom runs in but one race?

TWO FOR ARMY

Frank Cerny, hero of the Rainbow Relay Carnival, is booked for two long races—the mile and two miles—and the results look like new records for the soldier boy. He has incidentally created the present marks last year.

The University star, Myatt, looks like the new owner of the mile walk mark which is held by Jimmy Smith if his performance Saturday is any indication. If the Dean captain, Hung Wai Ching, should save himself for just one competition, he'll smash Al Lemes' broad jump record. He leaped over 21 feet frequently after strenuous races.

All the other establishments look safe for another year at least.
