

HOLD PLUNGE AT PUNAHOU TANK TODAY

The plunge for women, one of the Swanzy cup events listed on the program for the Hawaiian championship swimming meet tonight, will be held at Punahou tank at 5:15 p. m. today.

Officials and coaches are requested to report at the tank at 5 p. m. to handle the event. It was decided that Punahou tank would be more satisfactory than the natatorium for the plunge.

The Hawaiian championship meet's second night program will start at the natatorium, Waikiki, at 7:45 p. m. tonight.

FOUR RECORDS GO IN SWIM MEET

steady stroke. Crabbe's time for the 500 meters had been 6 minutes 30 seconds. His time for the 1000 meters was 13 minutes 8 2-5 seconds.

Starts Sprint

When the gun sounded at the start of the final 100 meters of the race "Buster" opened up with his sprint that carried him to the finish line for a new American record of 20 minutes 49 2-5 seconds, just one minute 5 2-5 seconds faster than Beaufreire's mark which had stood since 1921.

There was not enough timers on the 500 mark to apply for a record in that distance. The 1000 meter and 1500 meter marks should stand as there were the required number of official timers on each.

Bill Newport of the Outrigger club and M. Kallil of Hui Makani made fine performances, finishing in the order named. Newport made the best time he ever hung up in that distance, being 50 3-5 seconds back of the old American record. Crabbe was more than 100 meters ahead of Newport at the finish.

Another Record

Another record was broken in the 100 meter freestyle swim for women when Lily Bowmer May opened with a sensational sprint which carried her to victory over Mariechen Wehselau, who took second, and Mildred Slight, who was third. The girls are all from the Outrigger club.

Miss Wehselau took the lead at the start of the race and held it most of the way. Fifteen yards from the finish Mrs. May opened up with a sprint that enabled her to pass her opponent just before reaching the finish. It was the most sensational race of the evening. Mrs. May was completely exhausted after the race, but she showed by her stellar performance that she is still in the class with America's leading women swimmers.

Application will be made for recognition of Mrs. May's mark as a world's record for a straightaway course and for Crabbe's 1000 and 1500 meter marks as American records.

Young Swimmers

Some of the younger swimmers came to the front with exceptionally fine performances. Manuella Kallil of the Hui Makani finished third in the 1500 meter race in good time. His brother, Manola, also showed up exceptionally fine when he won the 100 meter backstroke swim for boys under 18 in 1 minute 18 4-5 seconds.

Another sensation was unearthed in Lorena Hines, McKinley high school swimmer, who won the 50 yards girls' novice swim in 32 2-5 seconds. Ethel Matthewman of the Outrigger club was second and May Westcott of McKinley was third.

The time in the 200 meter freestyle event for men was rather slow, 2 minutes 24 seconds. Johnny Woodd of the Central Y. M. C. A. won the race with Bud Crabbe of the Outrigger club second. Woodd led practically all of the way and had several yards lead when 15 yards from the finish. Crabbe was stronger on the finish and pulled up quite a bit on the Central "Y" swimmer, but could not catch him.

The program tonight promises many thrills for the fans. Approx-

imately 1000 spectators were on hand to see last night's races, but it is expected that more will attend tonight, as the program is very inviting.

The program follows: Plunge for women (Swanzy cup), 100 yards freestyle for women (Swanzy cup), 100 meters backstroke for men, 200 meters freestyle service, 200 meters breaststroke for men, 50 yards backstroke for women (Swanzy cup), 400 meters freestyle for men, 100 meters backstroke for boys under 15, diving for women (Swanzy cup), 400 meters freestyle for women, 50 yards breaststroke for women (Swanzy cup), 400 meters relay service, 200 meters freestyle for boys under 18, and 400 meters club relay.

The 400 meters freestyle for men, 100 meters backstroke for men and 400 meters freestyle for women are the races in which records will be in danger.

The meet will start promptly at 7:45 p. m.

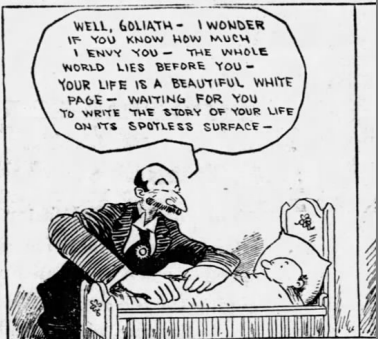

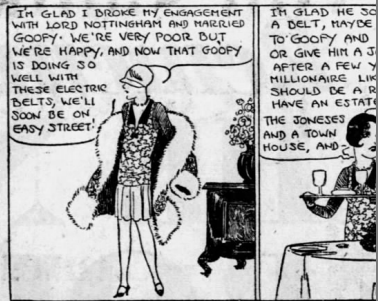
