

FORTUNE IS STAR OF SATURDAY MEET AT MEMORIAL POOL

Harvey Chilton's Yearlings Sensational; Souza Beats Pang in Breaststroke; Miss Slaght Defeats Miss Hines; Poor Crowd in Attendance

ONE startling upset closed the three-night Hawaiian A.A.U. championship-Olympic tryouts meet, the Hui Makani 800 meters relay team, coached and trained by Harvey Chilton, defeating the Outrigger Canoe club four, tutored by George "Dad" Center.

Johnny Fortune turned in the most brilliant performance of the evening when he covered the 100 meters freestyle for boys under 18, in the record time of 1 minute, 33.5 seconds.

The relay brought every fan in attendance to the side of the pool. "Buddy" Crabbe, swimming the first lap for Outrigger established a four yard lead over Warren Kealoha. Manuella Kalili caught W. Newport and Johnny Fortune who left his mark at the same time as Nason Newport gained a twelve yard lead over the Outrigger man. "Buster" Crabbe, local flash, set out to catch Maiola Kalili but the assignment was too much. Kalili swam a beautiful race and nosed Crabbe to the finish by five yards.

FORTUNE REAL SENSATION

In addition to breaking the record for the 100 meters boys under 18 freestyle, Fortune placed second to Johnny Woodd of the Y in the 100 meters open. Fortune lost out by a touch. Fortune's showing in the relay certainly had plenty to do with the Hui Makani team winning the event. Inasmuch as this is Fortune's first year in fast company, he can be expected to show much more class in the future.

SOUZA ALSO GOOD

Another newcomer who gained the admiration of the fans was Henry Souza. Souza won both the 100 meters breaststroke open and the same distance for boys under eighteen. In the 100 open, Souza defeated Ah Kong Pang for first honors. Souza, likewise, will be heard from in the future.

MILDRED SLAGHT WINS

Mildred Slaght, one of Center's prodigies, won the 200 meters freestyle for girls under 18. Miss Slaght nosed out Lorena Hines, another of Center's pupils. Taking the lead from the very start Miss Slaght swam with a fascinating stroke never to be headed. She won by ten yards.

Betty Hammond won the 100 meters breaststroke for women and placed second to Lily Bowmer May in the 100 meters backstroke.

HESS-LEE WIN DIVING

Hess of the Outrigger club won the spring board diving while Lee of the Army won first places in both the high diving and the fancy diving.

The final event of the evening, the women's 400 meters club relay was won by Outrigger team number one, composed of Meriechen Wehseku, Mildred Slaght, Janice Lovett Makinney and Lily Bowmer May.

ORIENTAL TITLE TO PALAMAS

Japanese Champs Defeat Filipinos by 3 to 1

THE Palamas, champions of the Japanese baseball league, won the Oriental baseball title for the second consecutive year by their victory over the Young Filipinos yesterday morning 3-1 at the Honolulu Stadium. The Pals defeated the Mun Luns, Chinese circuit leaders, in their first battle without any trouble. The champions will keep the Beaven trophy another year.

A much rejuvenated Filipino team faced the 1928 leaders and but for their erratic fielding in the critical moments, would have possibly vanquished the Japanese team. The Filipinos' sturdy stand was a surprise and the Pals were lucky to win.

Both Villahermosa and Omura hurled fine ball for the teams and went the whole route without weakening. The Japanese star struck out eight and was peppered for four hits. Villahermosa did not fare so well on the peak but his seven hits were well scattered.
