COMMITTEE PICKS BEST IN HAWAII TO MAKE JOURNEY

No Relay Team to San Francisco; Kealoha May Be Sent if He Shows Better Speed in Coming Lincoln Meet; Girls Go East

CLARENCE (BUSTER) CRABBE, national one-mile champion; Mariechen Wehselau, former member of the American Olympic team, and Lily Bowmer May, sprint swimmer, will go to the Olympic trials on the mainland next month—Crabbe to San Francisco for the national A.A.U. championships June 5, and later to Detroit. Miss Wehselau and Mrs. May will compete in the women's outdoor championships and will go direct to the eastern part of the United States.

This decision was reached at a meeting yesterday morning of the Hawaiian A. A. U. swimming committee, who will recommend to the finance committee that the swimmers mentioned in the foregoing be sent. Those who attended the meeting yesterday included George (Dad) Center, Harvey Chilton, C. Dudley Pratt, Pop Pfaender and Victor Lidga.

It was decided not to send a relay team because of the slow time recorded during the local A. A. U. championships and Olympic team trials, when Hui Makani defeated the crack Outrigger quartet.

There is just a possibility that Warren Kealoha may be sent to the coast. He is the Olympic backstroke champion and claims that he can make better time than was shown in the local meet.

The committee also made it plain that if any of our local swimmers demonstrated that they could negotiate their favorite distance in record breaking time at the Lincoln meet scheduled for the Memorial Pool next Saturday night that a last minute recommendation might be made.

There is something like \$1000 in cash available right now for expenses and this means that \$3000 more will have to be raised, if Center is to accompany the swimmers to the Pacific Coast and later to the East. A chaperone for Miss Wehselau will not be necessary because Mrs. May can act in that capacity during the trip to the Coast and the girls will both be placed with the Los Angeles chaperone when that port is reached.

It is felt that the three swimmers selected can and will make the American Olympic team.
