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held a lead of less than two strokes. Martechen began to spurt to which challenge Lily responded, and one of the greatest sprint finishes ever seen hereabouts resulted in a new world's record. Lily was about one stroke ahead of Martechen and was thoroughly spent. Jennie coasted in some five seconds later.

WINS OTHER EVENTS

In addition to this record-breaking performance, Mrs. May took first place in the 100-meter breaststroke and 50-yard backstroke races for the highest individual points. And a more brilliant star than she never scintillated before.

Twenty-one events comprised the water carnival which resulted in one world's record, two island records for boys under 12 and three more in the service circles of the Hawaiian department.

There were several lagging moments, long waits between events, attributed to lack of sufficient officials, the meet ending around 11 o'clock. However, the McKinley High School band and glee club was on deck and did their stuff with credit.

Warren Kealoha failed to put in an appearance in the 100-meter backstroke event, in which race Warren was to show whether or not he still had the goods to deliver as he did in the last Olympics. But as it was, Warren forfeited a golden opportunity. John Komenaka of the Nuuanu Y won the event in 1:18.1.

Herman Brots of the Army was the highest point gatherer, with three first places, turning this trick all in record-breaking times as far as the service records go. He shattered the 100 and 200 meters crawl, also the 50 meters backstroke.

In the men's open events, Johnny Woodd, once regarded as Olympic material but having gone back slightly, although the fastest male swimmer of Hawaii and yet to be defeated in the 100 meters crawl, captured first place in the 100 and second in the 400 meters, which was won by Clarence "Buster" Crabbe in fast time, and some 13 yards ahead of Woodd. This was Buster's last public appearance before sailing for the Olympic tryouts, and he was well rewarded by a silver cup for this special race.

H. Souza, another protege of the veteran Harvey Chilton, was not extended a bit to win the 200 meters breaststroke for men. He is a comer. Chilton's other boys, Fortune and the Kalihl brothers, also made good, and their showing boosted the Hut Makani into a lead in the final club tabulations, posting out the old rivals from Outrigger, 8 to 6. Central and Nuuanu Ys were tied, 5 apiece. In the women's field, the OCC was peerless, collecting 19 points while Jennie Woodd's single handed efforts carried the Uluual colors into second place with 4 digits.

Marian Schaffer, daughter of Loral Schaffer, Neffin Sweet and Bebe McMullen, daughters of Capt. Sweet and Capt. McMullen, all 8 year old tots, appeared in two 40 yard exhibitions of crawl and backstroke that were richly applauded by the crowd.

Little Louis Woodd, who will be remembered as the first contributor of the sum of one dollar sent to THE ADVERTISER to start an Olympic fund for local swimmers some two months ago, and who hopes to be an Olympic candidate in 1932, came through with flying colors as advertised by the announcer "that the 13 year old swimmer will attempt to break the island records in the 40 yards crawl and 40 yards backstroke events.

Unpaced and like a jumping swordfish the Halawa flash was off, clipping fully .68:1 seconds off the best island mark for kids under 12, in the 40 yards freestyle. Then after a short respite, Louis tore back on the home stretch, his backstrokes flipping at a rapid pace and his little legs kicking such foam as to bring about a hushed admiration from the stands. The youngster negotiated this event in 32:1, which was almost 4 seconds better than the last record. Summaries:
