

Our Swim Champs To Show 'Em

Records Sure to Fall in
National Indoor Aquatic Events

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SAN FRANCISCO, May 25. —Aquatic records are expected to fall when the national outdoor swimming championships are held at Fleishacker pool here June 7-10 and three Honolulu entrants are among those favored by the experts to set new marks.

Followers are particularly interested in seeing what Duke Kahanamoku, noted Hawaiian swimmer, will do in the 100-meter race. The Duke will take time out from his arduous tasks in Hollywood movieland to represent the Hollywood Athletic club.

Kahanamoku's entrance means that the local meet will attract many swimming fans from all over the coast, as the Duke is unquestionably the most popular swimmer who ever lived.

Despite his 38 years of age, Kahanamoku is said to be swimming as fast if not faster than in 1912, when he won his first world's title at Stockholm, Sweden. In 1920 he again won the world's title in the Olympic Games at Antwerp. He finished second to the great Weissmuller in the 1924 events at Paris.

The A. A. U. recently restored Kahanamoku as an amateur, after previously ruling that he had lost his standing, and as a result the colorful Hawaiian swimmer will attempt to make the United States Olympiad team this year.
