New World's Record Made In Mile Swim By Hui Makani Lad

Kalili Clips Off Three Minutes From Old Mark

MANUELA KALILI, developed by MHarvey Chilton, the capable swimming coach of Hui Makani, won the annual Ala Wai canal swim yesterday in what is believed to be a world's record for the straight a way course. His time was announced as 20 minutes 43 1-5 seconds and it lowers the previous mark held by Benton Wood by more than three full minutes.

Kalili displayed exceptional prowess throughout the race. As the gun barked to send the swimmers away. Sam Kahanamoku, veteran sprint swimmer cut out a terrific pace for a mile event, but the youngster kept close to his heels, and when Sam had covered 500 yards, he was forced to slow down and surrender the lead to the Hui Makani star. At the half mile, Kalili was going great guns. Two stop watches caught him in record time. He finished fresh, with Kahanamoku second and Brotz of the Army third. In fact the first three to finish were well under the old rec-

"Kalili has undoubtedly made a brand new world record" declared Harvey Chilton last night. "The kid used his head throughout and could have gone further had it been necessary. Our club will apply for a world's mark for Kalili."

The one mile junior race was won by Bill Newport of the Outrigger Canoe club, who also swam a beautiful race and in the fast time of 21 minutes 5 4-5 seconds, smashing the old record of 24 minutes, 37 seconds which he himself established last year.

In the half mile race for girls. Mildred Slaght of the Outrigger won from the field in the good time of 12 minutes 35 3-5 seconds. Mildred is fast forging to the front as one of Hawaii's best women swimmers. All she needs is a little more strength which will come in a year or so and
